Silver Jubilee

In congratulating His Lordship on reaching the twenty-fifth year of the priesthood. God's priesthood is necessary for the welfare of mankind. Year after year Christ has been behind his work.

He also spoke of the faithful co-operation which the Bishop had received. There would no doubt be a continuance of that co-operation given with willing hearts in a genuine spirit of sacrifice. His Honor Lt. Gov., Hertz, Premier Stewart and Mayor McKenna attended the Mass.

Following is the text of the address presented by the Laly :-

To His Lordship RIGHT REVEREND LOUIS JAMES O'LEARY, D.O. Bishop of Charlottetown.

May it please Your Lordship : It is indeed an agreeable and a pleasant duty on the part of the clergy of the Parish of Charlottetown, on this auspicious occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary of your ordination to the Holy Priesthood, to offer to you the sincere expression of our affection, our congratulations, and our good wishes.

(Born in Richibucto, N. B., on August 17, 1877, you received your early training in the Grammar School of your native town. You then entered St. Joseph's College, where by your splendid abilities and your unremitting application to your studies you signally distinguished yourself. After reading Philosophy in the Little Seminary, you entered the Grand Seminary, Montreal, where you completed your Theology. As you were still too young for ordination, the faculty of that great seat of learning, realizing your superior talents, sent you to Rome to pursue a Post Graduate course, and there, in the Propaganda and Appollinare Colleges, you further prosecuted those studies in which you had already so distinguished yourself. You studied Theology Dogmatic and Moral, Holy Scripture, Canon Law, History of the Church, and received your Degrees. In the Church of St. John Lateran, on April 14, 1900, you were raised to the dignity of the Holy Priesthood by His Lordship Archbishop Capellari.

Returning to New Brunswick, in 1902, you were appointed Secretary to His Lordship Bishop Barry. Here, you fitted yourself by much study, by unremitting devotion to duty, and by your noble examples of the priestly functions, to enter upon still higher duties, and the Holy Father, in 1914, selected you as Auxiliary to His Lordship Bishop Barry, with the title of Bishop of Hieropolis. Upon the death of Bishop Barry you became Admini-

strator of the Diocese of Chatham, in which position you remained until your appointment as Bishop of this Diocese. Your Lordship came to us on November 11, 1920.

Since that day, we have been witnesses to the earnestness with which you have always laboured to promote the interests of religion in this parish; we have noted how you strive in season and out of season to sow in the minds of your spiritual children the wholesome seeds of sound doctrine, and how untiring and persevering have always been your efforts in all matters pertaining to our spiritual welfare. With deeds of benevolence Your Lordship's name has also been closely associated: the enlarging of Queen Square School, the improvements to St. Joseph's Convent, the founding of a Home for the Aged, and that crowning work of mercy, the building and equipping of our splendid new Hospital, will ever shed a bright lustre on your Lordship's Episcopate.

It is therefore with particular enthusiasm, that we, the laity of the Parish of Charlottetown, offer to you our felicitations and our hearty good wishes, and we gladly join the many distinguished friends of the clergy who honor the celebration of your Silver Jubilee, in wishing you length of days and undisturbed tranquility in your journey through life; and to the future we look with the hope that a kind Providence may long spare you to labor in the portion of the Lord's vineyard.

Your faithful people raise their hearts to God for you today; our best wishes are yours. Ad Multos Annos! Long may you live for the good of our Parish, for the advancement of our Diocese, and the glory of Holy Mother Church.

In conclusion, we beg of you to accept this purse, and while doing so to consider it a weak expression of the sentiments of love and esteem borne towards you by the Catholics of Charlottetown.
