One Of Shortest Sessions In History Of Canada

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 22.—The prorogation of Parliament today ended one of the shortest sessions in Canadian history. The war session in August, 1914, lasted only five days. The House of Commons this time sat through twelve working days, with the Senate functioning fewer than that. Three pieces of major legislation were passed—the bill appropriating \$20,000 to provide work and relief for the unemployed, a measure designed to prohibit dumping of both natural and

CHINESE CIVIL WAR IS ENDED

Manchurian Soldiers Enter Peiping Amid Scenes of Wild Acclaim—No Resistance Offered.

TIENTSIN, China, Sept. 22.—Armored cars containing 500 Manchurian soldiers entered Peiping today amid scenes of wild acclaim. The city was evacuated Sunday by the northern forces from Shanai Province, who for many months have waged war with the Nanking Government. The entry apparently ended the Chinese civil warfare. Peiping, once the city of the Manchus, offered no resistance and gave every indication of joy at the approach of the Manchurian troops.

COAL STRIKE IN SASKATOON

SASKATOON, Sask., Sept. 22.—A coal strike has been made thirteen miles from Lusland, Sask. T. HUGGINS, while digging a well on his farm struck coal at a depth of 22 feet. Later he bored another seven-foot hole and secured samples of the deposit which graded a high bituminous coal. Claims have been filed and test holes are being bored. Indications point to a seam several miles in length as there are several other farms in the district that report striking coal at various depths ranging from 93 feet.

Clause In New Tariff Bill

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 22.—A clause will be inserted into the new tariff bill which will provide for the non-application of the new rates upon bona fide contracts entered into prior to September 16. The period in which imports under this clause may enter will expire on December 1. Hon. R. B. Bennett informed the House of Commons today he would introduce an amendment later to cover this.

Will Accompany Premier Bennett

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 22.—Representatives of the wheat pool and western agriculture generally will accompany Premier Bennett and his Ministers to the Imperial Conference as technical advisers. Mr. Bennett announced in the House of Commons today. Those who will go are, A. J. McPhail, President of the Canadian Cooperative Wheat Producers, Limited; D. A. MacGibbon, vice chairman of the Board of Grain Commissioners; Professor Swanson of the University of Saskatchewan and John I. McFarlane.

New Harbor Commissioners Are Announced

OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—Appointment of Harbor Commissioners for St. John, N.B., and Halifax, N.S., has been announced by Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Fisheries. Members of the St. John Board are Harold C. Schofield, chairman, Frank T. Lewis and Thomas Nagle. For Halifax the appointees are Col. E. C. Phinney, chairman, J. L. Heston and Frank Merchant.

Twelve Changes In Bill Amending Tariff Act

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 22.—In the course of its progress through the House of Commons, twelve changes were made in the bill amending the Customs tariff. The major changes are those which permit parts and repairs for agricultural machinery to come in at the old rates until July 1, 1931, and which apply a different rate of duty to sweet potatoes from that imposed on the ordinary variety of spuds. Under the original bill, potatoes and sweet potatoes in their natural state were dutiable at 75 cents per hundredweight under the general tariff and were free under the intermediate and British Preference schedule. The new potato item is as follows: potatoes as hereunder defined:
A.—In their natural state per cwt:
B.—Free; Intermediate Free; General 75 cents.
C.—Dried, desiccated, dehydrated 15; British Preference Free; Intermediate Free; General 2 3-4 cents.
D.—Sweet potatoes in natural state per cwt.: British Preference Free; Intermediate 10 cents; General 15 cents.
E.—Sweet potatoes N. O. P. per lb.: British Preference Free; Intermediate 1 3-4 cents; General 2 3-4 cents.
The agricultural implement items are changed by adding an additional item to take care of repairs imported up to July 1 next. The proposal to increase the duty on sails for boats and ships by the addition of a specific duty of 3 cents, 3 1-2 cents and 4 cents per pound to the present ad valorem rate was dropped by the Prime Minister.

Predict Good Potato Market

FREDERICTON, N.B., Sept. 22.—Potatoes will bring \$4 per barrel in Aroostook County before the shipping of 1930 crop has been completed, according to predictions made by two of the most prominent potato shippers in the State of Maine, who have been attending the Fredericton Exhibition and who predict Canadian potatoes can be profitably shipped into the United States market this year, despite the duty. "The peak price reached on the 1929 crop was \$4 per barrel and there is not a doubt in my mind that that figure will be reached again by Christmas if not before, the holiday season," declared S. A. Wathen of Fort Fairfield, Maine, discussing the outlook for the potato market in Aroostook County. That means he explained richer returns for the growers in Aroostook County than last year because a smaller proportion of the 1930 output had been contracted for at early low prices than a year ago when the potato growers were not in a good financial circumstances as they were following the sale of the 1929 crop. Mr. Wathen is a native of New Brunswick.

Expects \$4 per barrel reached

"If it were not for the unfavorable general business conditions in the United States the financial situation and the industrial depression I believe prices for Aroostook County would reach even higher figures than the \$4 top last year, but even with these unfavorable conditions I expect this shipping season," declared George M. Reed also of Fort Fairfield and head of Reed Bros., who are among the biggest growers and shippers of potatoes in Aroostook County.

ANOTHER STORM IS APPROACHING BRITISH ISLES

Damage In Recent Storm Is Estimated At \$5,000,000—Lloyds Underwriters Facing Liabilities.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Damage in the week-end storm over the British Isles was estimated at \$5,000,000 tonight. Underwriters of Lloyds were said to face liabilities of a hundred thousand pounds sterling.
A new low-pressure storm area is approaching the British Isles from the Atlantic Ocean, due to strike southern Ireland and England. The storm which raged in the Channel Saturday and this morning, abated today, but swept out over the North Sea, striking the Dutch, German, Danish and Norwegian coasts.

Body Of Woman Found Floating In Que. River

QUEBEC, Que., Sept. 22.—The body of a young woman aged between 20 and 25 was found floating on the waters of Lac-Aux-Aulnaies, in Portneuf County, not far from this city yesterday, by a party of children who were playing near the spot. The children notified Joseph Bilbeau, owner of a neighboring muskrat farm who, in turn, called the morgue at St. Raymond. It was found when the body was withdrawn from the lake, that its legs had been secured together with barbed wire to which was attached a piece of lead pipe. The woman was still unidentified today after having been taken to the morgue, and the only clues were a wrist-watch and two rings one of them bearing the initials "G. M." From the state of decomposition it was believed death occurred fifteen days ago. A coroner's inquest will be held Tuesday.

A. E. McLean Sued By Ottawa Woman

Extraordinary Allegations Made In Suit, Application In Which Is To Be Heard In The Courts At Toronto Today. Mr. McLean Alleges He Paid Woman \$22,000 On Account Of Harassment.

OPENING OF CONFERENCE POSTPONED

Until October 1st To Allow Premier Bennett And Other Canadian Delegates To Be Present.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Reuters learns that owing to the special session of the Canadian Parliament which prevented Prime Minister Bennett and the other delegates from reaching London before Sept. 30, the opening of the Imperial Conference has been postponed until October 1.

Will Sail Today
The Canadian delegation to the Imperial Conference will leave Ottawa tonight, the special session of Parliament having prorogued today. They will sail from Quebec on the steamship Empress of Australia.

Sir George Perley Will Be Acting Prime Minister

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 22.—While the Prime Minister is attending the Imperial Conference the Hon. Sir George Perley will be acting Premier. Hon. Dr. Manion will act as Minister of Trade and Commerce; Hon. W. A. Gordon as Minister of Justice and Hon. E. B. Ryckham as Minister of Finance. The duties of Solicitor General will be discharged departmentally by the Prime Minister said.

Bennett Questioned On Butter Prices

A provision in the amendments to the tariff would empower the Government to lower or remove any duty in the event of producers raising prices in consequence of the duty.
