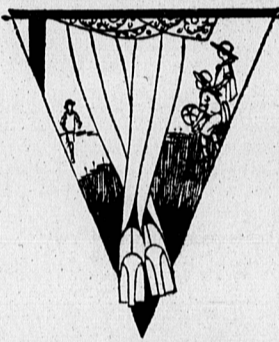

The MacLeods have lived at Dunvegan for over a thousand years, and the castle is rich in historical memories.

FOUR KILLERS TO DIE IN SASK. NEXT JANUARY

REGINA, Sask., Nov. 27.—Four murderers will go to the gallows in Saskatchewan early in the new year. John Pasowsky, 17, who shot his father on a farm in the Wynyard district was on Friday sentenced to die on February 21st, at Prince Albert jail. At the same time in the same jail Osk Primak, Lanigan slayer, will be hanged. This will be the first double hanging in the province in some years.
