A very encouraging report was read of the work done by the Ladies' Auxiliary. It showed nearly \$300.00 raised during the past year, and expended in making the Association building more attractive.

Yesterday afternoon Robert Jenkins tendered his resignation as Prosecutor of the Prohibition Act to the Premier, the resignation to take effect at the end of his year's appointment November 5th.

Mr. Jenkins finds that it is impossible for him at the present salary to conduct the work as it should be, and at the same time give attention to his home affairs.

Charlottetown Young Men's Christian Association. GENTLEMEN:—In looking back over the year that has passed since the last annual meeting we see great cause for thankfulness to God for His goodness to us as an Association.

The reports of the various Committees presented here this evening speak for themselves and I do not need to enter into details. Financially the Association has prospered, and while the Finance Committee do not report a clean sheet as they did last year, a large amount of money has been raised, and friends have contributed generously.

The Physical work has been strong and most attractive to many young men and boys. This is a very valuable department of Association activity and its usefulness could be very largely increased if better equipment was provided.

Educationally the Association has maintained its former position. The Reading Room is well stocked with desirable periodicals and the library continues to be largely used.

The Association is fast becoming a social centre for young men, and this year a change was necessary in the rooms to provide for the large number of young men coming to the building.

The Religious work of the Association has been strong and we are encouraged by the fact that not a few young men definitely yielded their lives to Christ as a result of the efforts put forth.

The rising generation is now receiving more attention than ever before. In view of the fact that we are touching the lives of the boys at the time when character is being formed and life's direction decided the wisdom and urgency of special effort is seen.

The membership is larger than ever before and shows an increase of 30% over last year. Almost a score of members have left the city since last annual meeting.

The building is now in good condition

During the past year Mr. Jenkins has imposed \$4700 in fines of which \$3800 has been collected. Six third offences have also been obtained and a number of the most prominent liquor sellers have left the city.

The Ladies' Auxiliary have again as in other years proved themselves necessary to the best conduct of the Association.

The Committee force of the Association is about the weakest point, and if this was strengthened much better work could be done in every department.

During the year your Secretary has conducted the general correspondence of the Association, assisted in soliciting and collecting subscriptions, enlisting new members, aiding the Treasurer in his work, keeping records of cash and giving statements to treasurer.

In closing let me thank the officers and members of the Association for their kindness and sympathy at all times in the work it has been my privilege to perform.
