Schooner Realty, Capt. Miller, cleared from Cascumpec on Monday with a cargo of oats in the hold, and four horses and two cattle on deck. Some four or five passengers were also on board.

ACCOUNTS from many sections of the province tell that the hay crop is considerable short this season. A gentleman from Vernon River told THE GUARDIAN yesterday that in his section the yield of hay would be little more than half of the large crop of last year. Other field crops are however, looking well.

THE Sunday School of the Alberton Presbyterian Church held their annual Picnic at Montrose on Tuesday last. A very large number met together and although the afternoon was very showery every one present seemed to have enjoyed themselves. The Revs. Mr. McDonald and Mr. Gratz were present.

WORK has been started on the new sewerage system for Truro. The portion to be put into operation this summer is to cost about \$30,000. It is being constructed in two divisions by contractors A. C. McKenzie and F. Dexter & Co. Frank Wilson has the contract for the cement and all mason work. There are about 100 laborers in the trenches now and more are wanted. The construction is being superintended by R. S. Lee, of McGill University, a native of P. E. Island.

We understand that arrangements have been made by which Mr. T. W. Hodgson, Dominion Line Stock Commissioner, will during next week address several meetings to farmers and dairymen in different parts of the province, of which full particulars will probably be given in our next issue.—Mr. Hodgson, accompanied by several other gentlemen will arrive here on Saturday the 28th inst. and we are informed that a meeting will be arranged with our Provincial Government and Board of Trade for Monday forenoon, at which the question of markets and transportation of live stock will be discussed. As Mr. Hodgson comes to us highly recommended we trust that every opportunity will be afforded to enable him to form a favourable impression of the possibilities of this Province.

OBITUARY.—Horatio Webster, Esq., of Rocky Point, Lot 65, passed peacefully away to his eternal rest on June 27th. The deceased has been in failing health for some time but was not confined to his bed until October last, when he contracted a severe cold, which terminated in congestion of the lungs, from which he never rallied but gradually grew weaker and weaker until the Angel of Death relieved him of his sufferings. Through all his sickness he manifested a patient and peaceful spirit, at all times resigned to the will of Him who doeth all things well and died trusting in the merits of a crucified Redeemer. Mr. Webster was born in Fort Augustus, Lot 49, 69 years ago and when a boy removed with his parents to West River. He was a man of great industry and perseverance, upright and honorable in his dealings and the pattern of sobriety for the neighborhood in which he lived. The funeral services were conducted by Rev.
