DOING SPLENDID WORK. During the past winter the ladies of the Methodist Red Cross Society of this city bought the yarn and knit over 800 pairs of socks for the soldier boys. They are having a patriotic strawberry festival at Mrs. B. C. Chapell's at Brighton tonight, and the proceeds will secure, they hope, many pounds of yarn for this winter's work.

NO CARGO.—It is not very often that the Halifax Herald, that a vessel comes from the "Garden of the Gulf" to Halifax without a cargo, particularly when potatoes are always in demand but such was the case when the schooner Eva June, Captain M. G. Munroe, arrived Sunday from Charlottetown, in ballast, to load lumber for an American port. The damage for the Eva June sustained was trifling when she was in collision with the tug Cruiser off Halifax, while on the way from New York to Charlottetown with hard coal, as before mentioned.

INSTITUTE MEETING.—The Annual Meeting of the Elmira Women's Institute was held at the home of Miss Mary A. McPhee on Thursday, July 6th, Miss Sterns presiding. Fourteen members and five visitors were present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. The Secretary-Treasurer then gave the yearly report of the Institute. A vote of thanks was tendered the returning officers. The business of the Bazaar was discussed. It was decided to hold it on the afternoon of Thursday, July 19. Miss Sterns gave a talk on "Canning of Fruits and Vegetables," which was very interesting. The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem. The next meeting was invited to the home of Mrs. William Stevens.

MacNutt in writing from Shoreham Camp, under date of June 26th, says:—"The following men of the old 105th Battalion left this unit last night for the 26th Battalion, France: No. 713208 Pte. J. D. Munroe; No. 712883 Pte. F. W. McEachern; No. 713169 Pte. R. P. McEwen. The following Island men left this unit yesterday to return to Canada as physically unfit: No. 713073 Pte. P. T. Campbell; No. 713143 Pte. M. DesRoches; No. 712615 Pte. W. B. Gallant; No. 712944 Pte. A. K. McKinnon. These men while overseas have been good soldiers and, much to their regret, they were returned home for above reason. They, at least, have tried to do their duty. We were glad to see Sgt. Fred Andrew, of East Royalty. He enlisted in the 6th Mounted Rifles. He has been in France for nearly two years, was wounded twice, and now looks the picture of health. He returns to France in a few days. He came down here to see his uncle, C. Q. M. S. F. W. Andrew, of this battalion. We also had a visit from Corporal Whidden, of the 6th Mounted Rifles (now 5th Mounted Rifles). He is a nephew of Professor Barlow. He has also been in France and looks fine."

THE WAR ANNIVERSARY.—At a meeting of the Merchants Association held this week at which Mayor Brown and Rev. Major Fullerton were present, it was decided by the members of the Association to close their stores on Saturday, August 4th from 9.45 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the occasion of the anniversary of the declaration of war by Great Britain. The day will be observed with special services in the churches at 10 a.m. and an appropriate programme at 11 a.m. at Victoria Park.

HONOURS FOR CAPTAIN HAZARD.—Captain Gerald F. Hazard, Royal Marine Artillery, son of the late Captain Fenwick Hazard and a nephew of Mr. Horace Hazard of this city, is among the brave British officers, who have been distinguished themselves at the front. A letter recently received in this city, brings

the news that Captain Hazard has received another decoration for his services in France. This time it is a French one. "The Croix de Guerre" with "Silver Star." The inscription on it, is in French. It states that Capt. Hazard served in a French sector for the past twenty-six months in one of the batteries in the centre. He proved himself on a number of occasions to have a complete disregard for danger. In assuring the service of the guns, in a difficult situation, he was slightly wounded. Capt. Hazard was promoted to his present rank on February 18th last.

LAND DRAINAGE OPERATIONS. That the proper operation of land drainage is worthy of adoption is being fully demonstrated by the farmers of the Mont Carmel district. They have organized themselves into groups and are arranging to open large outlet drains for the benefit of adjacent farms. Last year one such drain was opened and the direct benefit was so marked that several such drains are under construction or contemplated for this season as

well. Many farmers are considering the under-drainage of some of the lowest fields on their farms, for which the open drains will be used as outlets. As such work progresses the prospect for better crops becomes evident as in most cases it is a matter of getting clear of surplus water. The need for land drainage is a provincial one and will demand more attention as the value of such work becomes known.
