—DOCTORS MEET TO CONSIDER SCALE OF FEES.—The medical men of Summerside, Kensington, Emerald, Stanley Bridge, and Bedoune met in Kensington on Friday afternoon, Sept. 22, 1916. The purpose of the meeting was to consider the new scale of medical fees which was adopted at the last regular meeting of the Prince Edward Island Medical Association, a printed copy of which has been sent recently to every member now practising in this Province. After a careful consideration of the different items from the viewpoint of the country practitioners rather than the city physician, which necessitated a few changes on account of local conditions, the members present pledged themselves to adopt a common scale of fees with special consideration of the conditions met in country practice. The public will find no very radical changes except in a few instances. The fee for ordinary confinements is fixed at \$10.00, with an extra charge for operative cases. An extra fee of 50c to \$1.00 will be charged for visits at night. The cost of medicine is not included in any of the fees mentioned, whether the physician dispenses his own medicine or not. In order that there may be no misunderstanding, a notice with the approved scale of fees will be posted in each doctor's office and also at the Drugstore.

—More Demands On Greek Government (Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, October 16.—Admiral Du Fournet, commander of the Anglo-French fleet, says a Reuter despatch from Athens, yesterday addressed a complimentary note to the Greek government, demanding on behalf of the allies the control of the Greek police, the prohibition of Greek citizens from carrying arms, the stoppage of sending war munitions to Thessaly, and the lifting of the embargo on the transportation of Thessalian wheat. The Greek cabinet sat with the chief of the general staff until midnight discussing the note. The council was resumed in the morning when all the demands of Admiral Du Fournet were accepted.

—The British minister here has visited M. Zolotas, the new Greek foreign minister, whereby the entente recognizes the new cabinet.

—SAW PERISCOPE OF A SUBMARINE. (Canadian Press Despatch.) NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—In a wireless telegraph from the Danish steamer Hellig-Olav received here today, by agents of the Scandinavian American Line, Captain Hols, master of the ship, stated that no submarine had been sighted during the voyage so far. His message, dated 8 a. m. Sunday, reads: "Have not seen any submarines. Nothing true in the story." (Signed) HOLS.

—Observers aboard the White Star liner Bovic on the steamer's arrival here Saturday reported they have seen the periscope of a submarine, Sunday morning, when about 200 miles out and that the submarine was apparently in pursuit of the Hellig-Olav, eastward bound. Representatives of the Scandinavian American Line here sent a wireless message to Captain Hols of the Hellig-Olav, advising him to report and asking for details.

### Neutral Nations To Use Interned Ships

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, October 16.—Neutral nations are offered the suggestion, that they use German ships interned in their ports to compensate them for submarine losses, by the shipping correspondent of the Times. Discussing the world shortage in tonnage the correspondent says: "In view of the continued wanton destruction of neutral shipping, British owners are wondering how much longer neutral countries are going to allow German vessels to lie idle in their ports." After stating that there are ninety German ships in Chilean harbors, the correspondent continues: "While, like all neutrals, Chile is suffering from lack of tonnage, therefore, in the view of the British ship owners, Chile, if she will not use these ships to export her products to Europe, should be asked to lease them to a power which can employ them and who will indemnify her for any loss in port and harbor charges."

### PUNISHMENT OF RUBBER SMUGGLERS.

—COPENHAGEN, October 16.—The Criminal Court sentenced Hans Voigt, a German, and manager of the Continental Caoutchouc and Gutt Gutta a Percha Company and his three assistants, two brothers, Tuchen and Puleen Jensen (also German subjects), to four months' imprisonment each and a fine of £23,000 sterling, to be paid by them jointly to the Danish Exchequer, for having conspired to smuggle rubber to Germany. They sent six wagons of rubber hidden in herring barrels. Another German, named Woelfe, was implicated, but he is imprisoned at present in Germany having owned that he had also smuggled drugs from Germany into Denmark.

### STEPHANO FIRED ON WITHOUT WARNING.

—WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—The British steamer Stephano, sunk by the German submarine U-53 off the New England coast last Sunday, was fired on without warning, the commander Captain Clifford Smith, reported in an affidavit received today by the State Department.
