THE GOODNESS OF GOD

The University Magazine, that bright publication which is edited by a committee for the McGill University and published quarterly has many clever contributions from writers who are in the foremost ranks of Canadian literary men. The latest issue contained a number of such. The bulk of them dealt with the topics which form the Imperial Idea now so widely prevalent throughout the Empire, and not least in importance in an article by Dr. Andrew McPhail, an Islander, on "Loyalty to what" But easily notable among the contributions is that entitled The goodness of God, by E. W. McBride, an extract from the conclusion of which will give an idea of the general worth. The question of the immortality of the soul stands or falls with that of the goodness of God: If God be really good, the only possible hope of our ever having the present evil explained away lies in a future existence. No clap-trap such as even Huxley lent himself to, about Nature being essentially just, about the good being happy on the whole and in the long run, can blind us to the accidents and tragedies of existence where the innocent suffer cruelly for the faults of the guilty; they are totally irreconcilable with goodness unless there is more of existence than we can see here.

To sum up the goodness of God cannot be proved by external arguments, nor by the study of Nature. The conviction that God is good arises from the presence and imperious power of the Moral Idea in our own hearts and its revelation in the lives of others, but above all in the life of the founder of Christianity. The proof that the moral idea had a history and grew is no more an argument against the validity of its claims than is the fact against the claims of reason. Both stand or fall together, and we gain trust in both by following their light.

Only then if we see in Christ the revelation of the true character of the awful Power manifest in Nature do we deserve the name of Christian. If we do so, no one has right to deny to us the name, because we confess that there is much in Christian tradition which appears temporary and false.

Sticks may break and stones may crumble. The eternal altars tilt and tumble. We stand unshook to age from youth Upon this one pin-point of truth."

THE 200,000 CLUB OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

SIR—In respect to the above named club, it is impossible at this early stage of its existence to give the public all the details of the vast amount of useful and profitable work that might be accomplished by this organization. In this letter however I will outline one branch of our work that we will endeavor to push forward with all our might.

In order to carry out this particular idea that I refer to, we will procure a number of large blank volumes, for the purpose of recording all information received on all the various products of this province.

For instance suppose we begin under the heading of Oysters. We will first write to people whom we think know something about the habits and mode of cultivation of this succulent bi-valve, and request them to send in all available information in their possession regarding this product. We will then record in our encyclopedia all the information of value, not already obtained, that we can get from these letters. We will

also endeavor to find out all the prevailing laws in regard to protection of preserves in close season, and individual rights to oyster beds, etc., etc.

Then the production of honey will be gone into in the same way. In England I am informed there are 100,000 colonies of bees in existence in one territory not as large as this province, and the conditions for the promotion of this industry are not as favorable there as here. The market for pure honey in Canada is good almost anywhere. During my travels through the Maritime Provinces I have seen lots of honey for sale that came from California and other parts of the United States.

Cranberry raising, the manufacture of evaporated apples, the production of sugar beets, flax, etc., etc., the manufacture of shelled codfish in packages, the raising of squabs which always bring a good price in any large city, and many other things we will endeavor to find out about and keep the public informed of. This work, alone ought to take a large proportion of our time, and at the end of a few years perhaps we can get our encyclopedia printed and published and supplied to the public at cost. Concerning the other lines of work to be followed up by this club I wish to state that fuller information thereon will shortly be given. 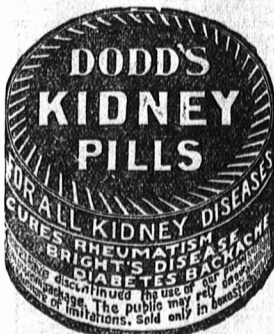
