OTTAWA, Dec. 15 (CP) — Canadian women in "mottle-dress" whether service uniform, nurse's uniform, house dress, business suit or overalls — play an increasing part in the struggle toward victory in 1943.

Since June 1942, the number of women engaged directly or indirectly in war industry has increased from 120,000 to more than 260,000. Women in the armed forces numbered about 38,000 late in November. Latest available figures show that about 1,200,000 civilian women are employed in war work in Canada. Rex Eaton, associate director of National Selective Service, told The Canadian Press.

"The outstanding characteristic of this year has been the successful appeal to a group of women who ordinarily do not seek employment for full or part time," she said.

Youngsters to members of the Local Council of Women and Women's Institute during the late spring women were in their force blue hat.

Latest available figures show that about 1,200,000 civilian women are employed in war work in Canada. Rex Eaton, associate director of National Selective Service, told The Canadian Press.
