## STELLARTON BOYS BADLY MANGLED

MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 8.—Terribly shocking details of the mine explosion at Stellarton, N. S., by which four boys had their lives related. The shock of the explosion shook the town and one of the boys was so horribly mangled by the explosion that some thirty different pieces of his body were picked up in various sections. His head was found in one spot, part of a leg in another, a whole leg in another corner while parts of his body were scattered in all directions. That the force of the explosion was terrific may be judged from the fact that one lad was blown one hundred feet from the mouth of the pit, his body being hurled over some trees near the mouth of the shaft the trees being thirty feet in height. In the spot where this lad's body landed a hole in the ground some three inches deep was made by the impact of the body. The bodies of the other lads were also frightfully mangled.

## OBITUARY.

At his home in Wilmot Valley on Aug. 22nd 1906 Peter B. Stavert an esteemed Christian citizen, a kind neighbor and true friend to all who knew him passed away from the present life in the 60th year of his age. For upwards of a year Mr. Stavert had been unwell but it was not until quite recently that grave doubts of his recovery were entertained. All that medical skill and kind friends could do was done but it was of no avail. Although his suffering during the past few months at intervals was intense, yet it was borne in a spirit of genuine courage and beautiful unselfishness and with patient submission to the Master's will. To his sorrowing wife, children and friends he leaves behind the memory of a true, noble and faithful life. The family consisted of nine in all, eight of whom survive their father. Edison the eldest son died some nine years ago. Those who remain are Rev. R. Hensley of Harcourt, N. B. Bertha of Harcourt, now at home; Annie, teacher at Farwood; May, a Freeborn; Erskine of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Charlottetown; and Fred, Nettie and Walter at home. Mr. Stavert was the youngest member of a large family eight brothers and five sisters one of whom died in early childhood. Six brothers, Walter and William of Kelvin Grove; James, North Bedouque; Robert of Summerside; Thomas of Wilmot; George of Summerside and one sister, Mrs. Andrew Humphrey of Kelvin Grove survive him. The deceased members of the family are one brother, James and three sisters, Mrs. Archibald McMurdo, Mrs. Samuel Waugh and Mrs. William Green. The funeral which was a very large one was held at his home in Wilmot on Aug. 24th. The services were conducted by Rev. R. G. Strahe assisted by Rev. S. J. McArthur a former pastor of N. Bedouque but now of New Glasgow, N. S., and Rev. M. J. McPherson of Pt. La Gardie Quebec. The six brothers of the deceased were selected as pallbearers, but William being indisposed on the day of the funeral his place was taken by Mr. John Walker, an intimate friend and brother elder in the North Bedouque church. The interment was made in the North Bedouque cemetery. For quite a number of years Mr. Stavert has been an elder and manager of the Presbyterian church at North Bedouque. Here as in all other spheres of life by the genuineness of manhood, his faithfulness to duty, his splendid unselfishness and characteristic thoughtfulness of others and above all his devotion to his God he has won a large place in the hearts of all who worked with him and has left an influence which though he no longer meets with us shall work for truth and right until "the day dawn and the shadows flee away."

Of him we may truly say "he being dead yet speaketh." Dear friend farewell, thou art gone and we are left behind; still, though gone, thy loving words and deeds shall live in memory's garden like sweet "forget-me-nots" and we shall hold the broken thread of our high discourse until we renew all fellowship within the unbroken family circle in the great Father's house on high.

Our prayer is: May "He who clothes the grass of the fields, who notes the sparrows' fall," guide with his unerring wisdom the steps, and provide in his boundless love for the needs of the loved one left until all men. —Com
