NEW SCHEME PLANNED FOR FIGHTING CRIME

(Canadian Press)
 LONDON, Dec. 15.—In connection with the scheme of the Home Office to establish, with the least possible delay, a national detective force for Great Britain, experts are now exploring the approximate cost of greater efficiency in crime prevention and crime detection. It is agreed among the authorities that local detectives are not good enough and that detection of crime by local forces is far from satisfactory, hence the Home Office move in the matter. Senior executive officers of larger representative forces have been invited to give their opinions on the national detective scheme and to forward to the Home Office suggestions that may facilitate the working of the proposed new arrangement, says a special correspondent of the NEWS-CHRONICLE. Among those being consulted are officers of the highest rank in the Criminal Investigation department of Scotland Yard. Criminologists of many years' experience, numerous senior officers, also Lord Brentford, the former Sir William Joynton-Hicks, Home Secretary in the Baldwin Government, have expressed themselves in favor of a scheme which would give a single body control of the organization for fighting serious crime in any part of the country.

Under the new arrangement highly-trained, efficient and alert detectives, skilled in every branch of their profession, would be immediately available in any part of the country to co-ordinate efforts, control and direct investigations, and conduct inquiries into all cases of serious crime. If carried into effect the new scheme will mean the establishment of a specified number of detached headquarters — miniature Scotland Yards — in about half-a-dozen principal provincial towns, each fully staffed and equipped for all kinds of investigations.

Enormous difficulties, not generally recognized militate against success of the forces of the law in the battle against crime under the detective system now in vogue. There are over 240 independent police forces in Great Britain, each with its own detective squad. Nowadays with the rapid growth of all kinds of transport, criminals know no boundaries but operate in any area where success and sufficient financial reward are easy to obtain. The time factor operates in their favor under the present method of crime detection. Local forces jealous of their own reputations and full of local pride duly investigate cases reported to them. Hours elapse — possibly days — then perhaps, or perhaps not, finger-print clues are forwarded to London for examination, and a search of the files is made. Meantime the criminals have disposed of their plunder and moved away from their usual haunts if the haul has been a good one. In the course of days full details of the missing goods and notes on the robbers' methods are circulated in the police journals for information of all forces.

It is said that the present scheme of the Home Office for allowing provincial police forces to seek the aid of Scotland Yard in cases of serious intricate crime is a failure. Local forces, either through false pride or cause it suggests inefficiency, decline to ask for expert assistance until clues have become obliterated and trails grown cold. Quietly and unobtrusively during the past few months Scotland Yard officers have been visiting the big provincial towns and inspecting, at the request of the Home Office the local crime records and index systems with a view—should the na-

The country would be divided into regions, and while each headquarters would be a self-contained unit, and controlled probably by an officer of the rank of chief detective inspector, the whole system would allow of united effort; and any concentration of forces necessary at any particular spot at short notice. As these regional headquarters there would be a staff of trained detectives, not only general all-round investigators, but men also with specialist knowledge, particularly useful to the type of investigation of the crime occurring in that specified area.

WANTS MEDICAL CO-OPERATION

(Canadian Press)
 LONDON, Dec. 16.—"There are not enough expert surgeons in the country to perform the work which an increase in the number of hospital beds must entail." This was an assertion made by Lord Moynihan in an address broadcast by radio over the British Isles. Lord Moynihan appealed for effective medical co-operation between the hospitals controlled by the local authorities and voluntary hospitals.

"In many towns," he said, "the voluntary hospitals, especially the great teaching hospitals, have long lists of patients waiting for admission, while in a neighboring institution, formerly a Poor Law hospital but now under the jurisdiction of a local authority, there are rows of empty beds. A great responsibility rests upon the local authorities to see that the most competent men are entrusted with the highly important duties with which they will be charged, for surgery is a work for expert hands."

Lord Moynihan made a more personal plea to patients not to delay in seeking medical advice. "The great need for the future advance of surgery," he said, "is concerned with an earlier approach of the patient to the surgeon. This is especially true in cases of cancer, where the disease is accessible to the surgeon, is curable in its earliest stage, for cancer is always at first a local disease."
