James Again Hero As Hawks Take Second Tilt 3-2

Maritime Champs Too Much For Montrealers As Moncton Wins Maritime - Quebec Championship—"Dud" James Scores Winning Tally—"Hub" Team Will Now Meet Ontario Finalists In Semi-Final Round.

STADIUM, Moncton, N. B., Mar. 22.—The Moncton Hawks will carry the hopes of the Maritime Provinces into the finals for the Eastern Canada Amateur Hockey championship. They turned back the bid of the Montreal Royals, Quebec title holders, 3 to 2 here tonight in the second of the two-game total-goal series constituting the first round of the Allan Cup play-downs and won the round 5 to 2. They blanked the Royals in the first game on Monday night 2-0.

Hawks Better Team
The Hawks were masters of the Royals tonight. Aside from a furious first period attack by the Montrealers which netted them one of their two goals, the Maritime champions literally skated the puckmen from the St. Lawrence into the ice. A goal by Sammy McManus unassisted late in the second period tied up the game score and restored for Moncton their two goal lead in the series. From this point on the outcome was never in doubt. The Royals fought gamely and absorbed terrific body punishment from the burly Moncton defence, but crashed this iron clad barrier only once, and that was in the third period.

Connolly Scores
Bert Connolly raced straight through the Montreal defence early in the final period and blazed the puck into the corner of the Montreal cage to give Moncton another lead in the game.

Neville Tallies
About five minutes later Dave Neville, star of the Royals, swerved through the Moncton rear guard and beat Foster as the net minder left his cage.

Miller and James Combine
Three minutes later Bill Miller and "Dud" James combined for Moncton's final goal. Miller cleverly drew the defence before passing to James who picked his corner before shooting the rubber into the lower corner of the Montreal cage.

It was a great game, not only from a Maritime point of view and the hockey the boys dished up tonight sent the customers away talking to themselves. Furious skating, alert defensive work with considerable heavy and vicious checking and sensational net minding, featured the play throughout.

The going was rugged all the way and in this particular type of play the Hawks seemed to excel. They took all the Montrealers could give them and were going strong at the finish. Referee George Foster called sixteen penalties, seven of which went to the Hawks and nine to the Royals.

The Quebec champions gave a powerful display in the first period and the force of their attack seemed to be wilder than Hawks and it was while the Maritime champions were unable to devise a system to repel the marauding Royals that Jimmy Kelly took brother Pete's pass from the corner and beat Foster easily. Pete had carried the length of the ice and was forced into the corner. The Hawks neglected to mark brother Jim.

McManus' goal for Moncton late in the second period was one of the prettiest plays of the night. "Dud" James shot him a long forward pass from his own territory as both were behind the Moncton blue line. McManus picked it up in the centre zone, poked it through the defence and barged through after it, beating Coulter in a final race for the goal.

Bert Connolly's goal early in the third period made the Montreal defence look peculiar. He faked a pass and jumped between them, recovering the puck, and gave Coulter no chance to save.

Neville gave the Montreal supporters some hope on his clever effort about midway through the session, but when "Dud" James, Mon-

ton hero of the series, blazed in Miller's pass it was all over. Thereafter the Moncton defence failed to make an error.

The Hawks will leave here Sunday or Monday afternoon for Upper Canada where they will meet the Ontario champions in the next round of the Allan Cup playdowns. They have yet to decide whether to play at Montreal, Ottawa or Toronto.

First Period
A drifter from the blue line gave Foster the first stop just after the opening face off. James went right through and hit the side of the net. Neville robbed Walker inside the Moncton blue line but his shot was weak. Foster came out to save from Neville when the Moncton defence men crashed and the Montreal centre was through alone. Walker was penalized for tripping.

Royals pressed their advantage and Foster was a busy man. Royals continued their pressure even with the Moncton defence man back. McDonald went through and shot from outside the defence and the Royals gave Moncton a scare with a return tally that ended with a mix up in front of the Hawks net.

Jim Kelly sent Montreal ahead in the game when he gave Foster no chance with a back handler of brother Pete's passout from the corner.

Moncton staged an attack of its own but poor shooting spoiled their chances. Coulter pulled off a great save when James and McManus broke through, the latter making the try.

McKenzie went off for a high stick. McManus shot after a pass from James which was deflected by Massey. Dud James was a skating demon and the Sunnybrae wizard never gave a better display in a Moncton rink. Both lines were changed often under the terrific pace. Irvine was sent off for holding. Massey followed him for pulling the feet from under James. Bill Gill went through but kicked the puck. The crowd roared as it went into the net but the referee called it back.

Second Period
Gill shot the puck into the crowd just as the second frame got underway and referee Foster spoke to him. James was penalized for an accidental trip of McKenzie in centre ice. Miller was working on defence with Gill and the pair were checking stiffly. McKenzie's burner from the blue line went over the top of the net.

Coulter slid out 20 feet to rob McDonald. Connolly and P. Kelly went off for roughing. The pace slowed down as both teams resorted to long shots, following in for rebounds. McKenzie was doing great work and causing the Hawks all sorts of trouble. Wilson was given an enforced rest for elbowing. A few seconds later he was followed by McKenzie for a knee check. The crowd went wild.

Even with Royals two men short, St. Germain went through and took a shot at the net. Gill was right in on top of the Royals net but the Saint cut across to spoil the effort. Moncton was playing four men on the attack. Great work by Coulter saved the situation until the two sinners returned.

Miller shook St. Germain with a terrific check. Coulter made another great save when Connolly rounded the defence.

McManus split the Royals defence to square the game count as Coulter came out to save. He catapulted over the prostrate net minder.

Bill Miller's scorcher from the blue line almost caught the corner of the net, giving Coulter lots of trouble. Neville went off for a knee check.

Third Period
Neville was still in the penalty box when the third period started. Coulter juggled McManus weak

For the school attaining the greatest number of points, a beautiful silver cup has been donated by Prowse Bros., while silver and bronze medals will reward individual winners. A capable staff of officials will handle the program. For all who cherish a love for keen and fair competition, who admire the swirl of flashing skates, who delight in stirring and fighting finishes—the big Interscholastic Ice Meet tomorrow night will be the medium of great enjoyment.

JAMES E. WRY AGAIN PILOTS M.A.H. ASSO.

Entire Slate Of Last Year Officials Re-Elected. J.E. Sterns Of This City, Second Vice President.

MONCTON, March 22.—(C.P.)—James E. Wry, Amherst, was re-elected President of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association at the annual meeting held here today, and with him were returned to office the entire slate of officials who guided the destinies of hockey in these three Maritime Provinces during the past year. B. A. Taylor, Moncton, was re-elected first Vice President; J. E. Sterns, Charlottetown, was re-elected second Vice President and the president appointed H. F. Tennant, Amherst as Secretary-Registrar, for another term. H. O. Schryer, Bathurst, is Past President.

Lengthy Session
The annual session was a lengthy one and considerable business more or less of a routine nature was transacted. Fireworks which have marked past gatherings of sport bodies in these Provinces were conspicuous by their absence and a fine feeling of co-operation ran through the session.

Asks Ruling of Amateur
The only evidence of a heated debate came late in the meeting when Harold Power, Antigonish, picked up the M. A. H. A. by-law and constitution book and asked for a definition of an amateur. President Wry explained that the definition of an amateur was given by the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada and was adopted by the C.A.H.A. and in turn the M.A.H.A. and these last named bodies had no power to change the definition. Mr. Powers' query was sidetracked when C. C. Gillespie, Moncton, President of the M.P.A.A.U. of C. requested that if Mr. Powers had any complaint or charges to make that he do so before the semi-annual meeting of the M.P.B.

The meeting opened this morning when the annual financial statement was submitted, which showed the M.A.H.A. had credit balance of \$1,099.35 and that 1237 players were registered with the association.

This afternoon Lloyd MacGowan, Montreal, Registrar of the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association, and Reg Grant, Montreal radio announcer were introduced to the meeting and both spoke briefly expressing their pleasure at being in Moncton and the cordial reception they had received.

Junior Question Discussed
A. E. Lordy, Halifax, brought up the question of school players registered as juniors being ineligible to compete for interscholastic honors. He thought this condition should be rectified and the players permitted to take part in both classes of hockey. Wallace Barteaux, Kentville, explained the situation as it affected the headmasters association in Nova Scotia, and pleaded for co-operation between that body and the N. S. Junior Hockey Association. As a result of the discussion, C. D. Shipley, Amherst moved that the two bodies get together and discuss the situation thoroughly with a view to arriving at a better understanding of the question.

B. A. Taylor, Moncton, and H. F. Tennant, Amherst, were appointed a committee to act with President Wry in connection with the expenses incurred by the junior clubs in the Maritime play-downs and also the intermediates.

The Waiver Clause
A resolution introduced by Wallace Barteaux, which would remove the "waiver clause" from the M.A.H.A. constitution, was defeated, but was brought up again under new business and resulted in more discussion. A committee consisting of C. C. Gillespie, W. Barteaux, J. A. Hanway and Jack Conr was appointed to look into the matter and bring in a recommendation to the meeting.

This committee retired and in a few minutes returned with a recommendation to the effect that the present rule governing transfers by the "waiver" route remain in force as it is at present.

Makes Suggestion
B. W. Robinson, Bridgetown, P. E. I., suggested that Junior and Intermediate Associations be formed in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and an Intermediate Association in Nova Scotia and that these bodies, if and when formed together with the Junior Hockey Association already in existence in Nova Scotia, have representation on the M.A.H.A. This was later made a motion and was passed.

Resolution Defeated
A resolution submitted by the Fredericton delegates, asking that a ruling be passed calling for all provincial play-downs in the senior class, be played on artificial ice, was defeated. The meeting went on record as being in favor of these games being played as at present but when natural ice is no available, the presence of the M.A.H.A. will exercise his power in having the games played on artificial ice. Mr. Lordy moved that the representative of the M.A.H.A. make a request to the C.A.H.A. for a sum of \$2,000 which will be used for the fostering of Junior and Intermediate Hockey in the Maritimes. The motion was carried unanimously.

On the recommendation of the president and registrar an auditor was engaged to open a set of books for the association in order that a clearer report of the financial condition of the association may be available. On motion of Mr. Robinson, Mr. Morrell, Amherst, was appointed auditor.

Moves Adoption of Pro Rules
Jack Conn, Halifax, moved that the M. A. H. A. recommend to the C. A. H. A. to adopt the pro rules as applying to the forward pass in the offensive zone. His motion was passed unanimously.

On the suggestion of President Wry, the Maritime Intermediate Champions were given the right to play-off with Maritime Senior Group B. champions in the Maritime play-offs. A motion to this effect was passed with Harold Powers, Antigonish, casting the lone negative vote.
