FRENCH DESTROYER BOMBARDS TURK CITIES

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, July 7.—The Athen's correspondent of the Telegraph sends the following:—A French destroyer made four trips to the Asia Minor coast from Chiosokobana, visiting all the bays and harbours. The warship destroyed twelve vessels acting as enemy supply ships and set fire to the Birmin forests. Another French destroyer bombarded Htsia, Chestham, and Agalon, destroying the light-house and customs station and sinking several ships.

(Special to the Guardian.) BERLIN, July 7.—The French War Office announced that the cruiser Jeanne D'Arc has again bombarded the Turkish town of Alexandria in the

Gulf of Iskanderium. Turkish authorities, the despatch adds, refused to haul down the German flag flying over the German Consulate and it was shot down by the French warship.

PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE

Cissy Fitz-Gerald, the famous English musical comedy star with her famous wink played the leading role in the four-part Vitagraph Broadway Star Feature at this popular theatre last night. The story of the play is as follows:

As they try to make their escape, their sudden appearances keep Cissy's heart on the jump, until Gotrocks, hiding in the fireplace, gets an idea from the soot on his face—sneaks a lambrequin from the mantel, wraps it around his head and is presented to Cissy's husband as her Hindoo servant. The other four get an idea from Gotrocks's costume and appear in turn. Hughie as "her aunt from the country," Tosca as a chef, Jack as a maid of all work and Cutey, who is hiding in the piano, as a piano tuner. Tosca, as the chef, is ordered to cook a special dish for the husband. His efforts to make good cause the stove to pour forth a dense volume of smoke. Neighbors, thinking there is a fire, call the fire department who flood the house with water, giving Cissy's admirers opportunity to escape. Husband and wife are now left alone with the exception of the various pets, who are peacefully floating about with the real maid.

IN MEMORIAM

MISS HELEN McLEAN.

Mr. and Mrs. James McLean have the heartfelt sympathy of their many friends in the death, which occurred yesterday morning, of their only surviving daughter, Helen, after a brief illness. Last Tuesday week, the 29th June, Miss McLean was taken ill with appendicitis and, an operation having been found necessary, she was removed to the Prince Edward Island Hospital, where the operation was performed. From the first the case was known to be serious, having developed very rapidly. Nothing that medical skill and care and the loving solicitude of parents and friends could do was left undone and the hope was entertained that her robust constitution and previous good health would carry her through, but the hope was vain. She passed away about six o'clock yesterday morning. The late Miss McLean was an exceptionally lovable girl, of a bright, cheerful and companionable disposition, loved and trusted by all who knew her. She was a member of St. James Church and one of its Sunday School pupils. Her pastor, Rev. Dr. Fullerton, was with her during her last moments. She had been for some time a pupil in the Union Commercial College, fitting herself for life's activities when stricken with her last illness. Death is at all times sad but especially so when, as in this case, it takes away in the morning of life one whose outlook upon life and its prospects is more than ordinarily promising. The affliction which Mr. and Mrs. McLean are called upon to bear is rendered doubly sad by the fact that only a little over two years ago their eldest daughter Elsie, only two years older than Helen, was called to the unseen world. The funeral takes place at 2 o'clock Friday from the bereaved home, 194 Prince street, to the Ferry Wharf, thence to West River Cemetery, where interment will take place. 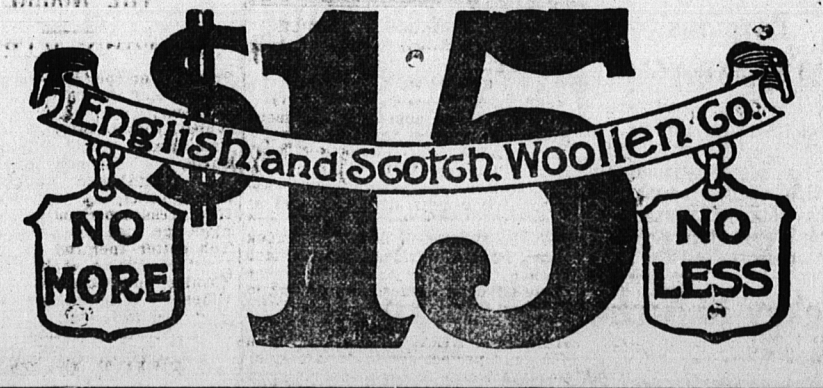
