BRITISH MAIL.—The next Canadian mail steamer will be the "Scandinavian," which leaves St. John, N.B., on Saturday the 11th. This steamer will carry the Christmas mail to soldiers who are in England, but as it requires about twenty days for mail to reach the soldiers at the front, they could not receive their letters or parcels before New Year. All mail going by the above steamer must be posted so as to leave this province not later than Friday morning, the 10th inst., but it would be advisable not to delay the mailing of parcels until the last moment.

VICTORIA SHIPPING.—On Nov. 23rd, the Schr. Marina, Captain Melvin Greek, arrived from Halifax with a cargo consisting of oil, salt and dry goods. On the 28th, the Schr. Bonus, Captain Charles Strigh, arrived from Charlottetown with a cargo of general merchandise. On Dec. 2nd, the Schr. Iona, Captain Johnson Lord, arrived in ballast from Charlottetown. On Nov. 23rd, the Schr. Howard, Captain Gault Murray, cleared for Sydney with a cargo consisting of 3,800 bus. potatoes, 650 bus. turnips, 100 bus. vegetables, 15 tons pressed hay and 50 tubs butter. On Nov. 27th, the Schr. Marina, Captain Melvin Greek, cleared for Halifax with the following cargo: 2,600 bus. potatoes, 100 bus. turnips and 25 bus. oats. On Nov. 29th, the Schr. Bonus, Captain Charles Strigh, cleared for Pictou, N. S. Her cargo consisted of 3,000 bus. oats, 1,200 bus. potatoes and 10 tons pressed hay. All the above cargoes were either consigned to or shipped by Wright Bros. The Schr. Iona is loading a full cargo of potatoes for Halifax. On Dec. 4th, the Schr. Alambra, Captain James Farrow, entered in ballast from Summerside and will be loaded with produce for Pictou by Wright Bros.—V.

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FIRE AT COVEHEAD.—The residence of Mr Alexander McDonald, Covehead, came nearly being destroyed by fire on Friday last. As it was considerable damage was done. Mr McDonald and two other men were busy putting roofing on the building at the time and were heating the cement used for it at the kitchen stove. It appears that the tins exploded and set the kitchen at once in flames. At first it seemed almost a hopeless task to save it, such headway had it made when discovered. However, owing to the cleverness of Mr Norman Brown, who was helping Mr McDonald with the roofing, and who so energetically fought the flames, the fire was extinguished.
