Agriculture In P. E. Island

AGRICULTURE IN P. E. ISLAND. PROMOTION OF GOOD IDEALS BY THE ROYAL AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The executive members of the Royal Agricultural Society were active in the promotion of good ideas about farm work, as well as in the encouragement of competition in the production of well-bred animals and grains and roots of the better kinds. They imported a number of books and pamphlets containing information of practical value to farmers. It was ordered that fifty copies of "The Farmer's Complete Farmer"—two hundred copies of "Faulkner's Farmers Manual," and one hundred copies of Professor Johnstone's Agricultural Atechism be procured for distribution throughout the country. The use of various kinds was strongly advised. It was resolved that prizes be offered to be competed for by farmers in each County who shall most successfully collect manures in the manner prescribed by the adoption of the system explained—the manure and the means made use of for collecting it to be examined in the months of October, 1950 and June 1951.

The Society strongly recommended those who competed for the prizes, together with those who desired to increase the quantity and improve the quality of their man-

ure, to procure from the Society's store, its branches and depots, "Faulkner's Manual," a small treatise on manures and turnip culture, price one shilling and sixpence. This recommendation coincided with the words: "Farmers, cease to throw away your manure." At the end of the first year in which the Royal Agricultural Society was active the executive committee reported that twenty-eight meetings of the committee had been held, that a branch of the Society had been established in Tryon, as well as branches in St. Eleanor's and Georgetown; that these Country Societies had had funds placed at their disposal for distribution as prizes, and that such a spirit of emulation had been stirred throughout the Province as it was hoped, "would be the germ of extensive and general improvement of the soil under the auspices of the competitors that no doubt can remain upon the mind of the most skeptical that what are considered the usual averages of crops are far below the capabilities of the soil under a better system." Another remark, the gist of which is discussed even in these days, is that it should be "an axiom, almost useful to all farmers, but particularly so to ourselves, that it is more profitable to cultivate a few acres well than to make a fruitless boast of the extent of any farm." It was added that "the possession of a sufficient number of animals to produce the necessary quantity of manure on a farm ought to be every man's aim, and the proper supply of these with good food, every farmer's care. Perhaps there are few soils so capable of remunerating the farmer in an equal ratio to the means employed as that of Prince Edward Island." Besides, mud from creeks and marshes is nearly universally at hand, or not far distant, and peat, leaves, etc., not far off.

All of this is as true and applicable now as it was when written and published. "Farmers of Prince Edward Island," it was added, "ask you, then, is your agricultural condition as prosperous as you would wish it to be? Do you avail yourselves of those aids which science has sought out to assist your labors and increase the returns of your soil? Are you working around the operations of the farm and by which your brother farmers have achieved such noble results? Do you endeavor to profit by the experience of scientific and practical men, by seeking for those repositories in which the results of their experience are recorded for the benefit of all who will peruse them? Or are you, in short, in the words of an able agricultural writer, 'determined to continue wilfully ignorant of the elementary outlines of a science which is the principal business of your lives?' These strictures are pertinent words may be read with interest and profit by many of our farmers in the present day.

Nurse Cavell's Dog Dies

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Oct. 24.—Nurse Cavell's favorite dog, Jack, which appeared with her in many of the photographs published at the time of her execution, has died. The body, mounted by a taxidermist, has been sent by the Duchesse de Crotoy to the Cavell Home for Nurses at Tomland, Norwich. In a letter accompanying the gift the Duchesse states: "Jack was in Nurse Cavell's possession from his early puppyhood, for about eight years. She was passionately fond of him; in her prison she several times asked after him, and in one of her last letters recommended him especially to the care of those that remained at the hospital. "I am sorry to say that the poor dog was not looked after at all after the murder, and when I took him he was in a sad condition, and mourned dreadfully at the loss of his beloved mistress. However, he soon got better, and after a time became gay and happy again. He grew very much attached to me, and lived constantly with me for eight years. He died last winter, to my intense regret, after only a few hours' illness." The lazy man would rather sit down and hope than go after a certainty.

PRACTICAL JOKER IS NEATLY CAUGHT

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Scientists at a Government dye laboratory were responsible for the disclosure of a clever practical joke. On the strength of an apparently old letter, a Buckinghamshire coroner was about to open investigations for treasure trove. This letter purported to have been written by a highwayman when pursued by runners. It gave minute directions for finding an iron box crammed with doubloons, jewels and piece-of-eight buried beneath a tree near Buckinghamshire Inn. The coroner sent the letter to the Public Record Office, who forwarded it to the Government Laboratory for examination. Analysis showed the paper to be old, but tests applied to the ancient looking ink proved that it contained a red aniline dye. Consequently its age could not be more than 40 years. The writer turned out to be a practical joker, who had torn a couple of fly-leaves from an old Bible.

MAXIMILIAN'S SECRETARY DIES FROM SHOCK AND IN POVERTY
MEXICO CITY, Oct. 25.—Jose Luis Blasio, who served Emperor Maximilian as private secretary during the brief reign in Mexico that ended with his execution, is dead as a result of the shock he experienced when the report was spread recently that the former
