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CUSTOMS PROBE CONTINUES AT HALIFAX, AUG. 25

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—W. F. O'Connor, K. C., joint counsel with R. L. Calder, K. C., of Montreal, for the Royal Commission which will conduct further investigation into the customs department, will leave Ottawa tomorrow for Halifax. He will be accompanied by P. T. Ahern, Registrar of the commission, and P. Sparks, president of the Commercial Protective Association. Mr. Sparks has been requested by the commissioner, Sir Francis Lemieux, and counsel, to attend in an advisory capacity with respect to possible improvements in the customs and excise service. Mr. Calder is already in Nova Scotia and will be at Halifax for the opening of the inquiry there on Wednesday, August 25th.

Speaking to a large Liberal audience, the Hon. Mr. Dunning says, he asked all present who never smuggled to hold up their hands, and only one dear old lady responded. Does he claim that all those Liberals were in the name of common sense?

We all know that Mackenzie King believes in the divine right to rule, but to ex-Finance Minister Robb we must list our hats, as the first known politician to claim divine knowledge. In the Strand he said—"I am as certain as that I am standing on this platform, that the next federal budget will be delivered by a Liberal." In some of his certainties of the past he has discovered that "the best laid schemes of mice and men gang aft a-gley."

Mr. Dunning, at the Strand, said "It is a matter of deep regret to me that any words of mine should be used for the purpose of promoting disunity in Canada." Then why did he use them? He doesn't deny using them. The Canadian press compelled him to swallow that pill.
