COOLIDGE NOT TO ACCEPT BRITISH TERMS

Feeling Exists That Geneva Meeting Will Break Up Without Reaching Agreement.

WASHINGTON July 30.—Through President Coolidge and his two cabinet advisers, Secretaries Kellogg and Wilbur, the United States government has reflected its chief objection to the British proposals for warship construction presented to the Geneva three power conference on the basis that they call for a larger United States navy expansion than the administration wishes to effect.

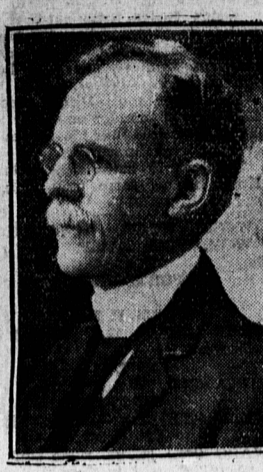
There is hardly a faint ray of hope in official circles here that the impasse will be dispelled and the conference continued after this plenary gathering.

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LORD BEATTY RETIRES AS FIRST SEA LORD

LONDON, July 30.—Lord Beatty, Admiral of the Fleet, went for the last time to the Admiralty today as the first sea lord; tomorrow he will be succeeded as admiral of the fleet by Sir Charles Madden.

Lord Beatty's term at the admiralty is memorable, not only for the length of over seven years, but for the far-reaching changes made over another nine years. Brilliant war service had been largely responsible for his advancement.
