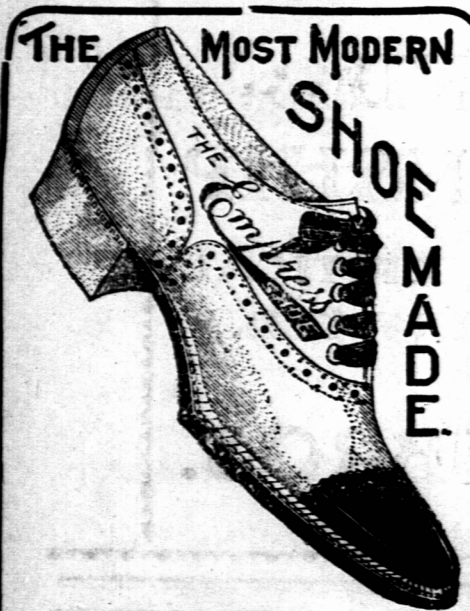

A very interesting service was held in Presbyterian Church last Sunday, when Children's Day and Promotion Day were fully observed. During the past year this Sunday School was graded, supplemental work prepared by the pastor was introduced and successfully completed. Examinations in the various classes were held in P. M. and the formal promotion took place at the above named service. The grading, which is based upon the age, recognizes the four departments. Primary, Junior, Intermediate and Senior in addition there are the cradle roll and adult departments. Pupils passing from one department to another received a diploma. In these departments there are several grades and in passing from one grade to another the pupils received a certificate and those who took the proper examinations received diplomas and certificates. Inasmuch as this was the first proper promotion great interest was manifested in the work and service. There was a large attendance. The supplemental work is carefully prepared giving a certain amount of work each Sunday in addition to the regular lesson. A course has been prepared with the authority of Presbytery suitable for all Presbyterian Schools. This is now one of the best organized schools in the Province. There is a Home Department of over 50 members, eighteen graded classes and two adult bible classes. In addition there is a teachers' normal training class. The school begins the year's work with bright prospects. What has been done in this school can be done in all Sunday Schools. The need of grading and graded instruction is being daily emphasized, the problems of the religious education of the young people can only be solved by applying the principles of thought which underlie all instruction and progress.
