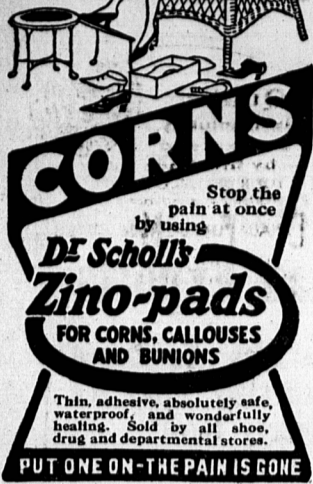

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Narcotics And Intoxicants

A Great Public Evil to be Combated.

It is reported that narcotics are making frightful havoc among the youth of Montreal. Eleven persons are said to have recently died there within three weeks, and three hundred and twenty-one to be in the public hospitals as the result of "taking drugs."

This is the official statement issued from Montreal's Police headquarters. It is stated by the Standard that "ghastly as the official toll reads it represents but a fraction of the havoc wrought within the period which it covers."

In the Province of Quebec, there are for sale by the grocery stores light wines, exhilarating beer, and stronger stimulants. It cannot therefore be true that "Prohibition" is the cause of the fatal "narcotic drug epidemic" that prevails in the City of Montreal. So one of the stock arguments against Prohibition has gone up in the air. It does not follow that because prohibition is the law of the United States, P. E. Island, etc., that the deadly drug habit is promoted—that narcotics are used instead of intoxicating liquors.

How it is that some men and some women will, in spite of reason and in spite of law, persist in putting an enemy into their mouths to steal away their brains; to undermine their health, and to cause degradation, poverty and death, passes comprehension. How it is that some persons will encourage others to defy and break the law of the land, in order that they may obtain surreptitiously, at high prices, the intoxicants and narcotics, which produce such results, can only be described in the words "what fools these mortals be." Two thousand years ago, Seneca wrote "Drunkenness is nothing else than a voluntary madness," and to drunkenness is now added the folly of the drug habit.

Fortunately, there is but a small proportion of the people who "with joy and pleasure, revel and applause, transform themselves into beasts," as Shakespeare remarks, or who are so regardless of their health, their well being and their lives as to indulge in intoxicants and narcotics. But the evil, now rampant in Montreal is one to be everywhere guarded against. It is an evil that affects the whole body politic as well as each individual participant in it; and it cannot be evidently it cannot be wholly abated by means of legal prohibition. To the law there must be added instruction in the sinful and deadly folly of the use of intoxicating stimulants and narcotics—except as medicines for the sick. The fact that in some cases of illness, these things are essential to recovery is not a good excuse for indulgence in them by those who are in good health. It is well known that indulgence in them, even to a small extent, causes a craving for them; and the craving for them has to be resisted and overcome for the effects will certainly be evil, if not fatal. The danger that lies in their misuse ought to be impressed upon the minds of all youths, in our homes, our schools, our churches. The welfare and prosperity of this country, dependent upon abstinence from intoxicants and narcotics, depends upon the teachers and ministers of all denominations should therefore emphasize the importance of such abstinence.

Happily the lure of the licensed tavern has been removed from this Province. In the country, particularly, the result has been good. Many of the poorer districts in which strong drink was formerly obtained with ease and partly taken of with avidity have forged
