Stars Increase Lead By Winning From Falcons 8-6

Holy Name Falcons are still seeking a victory over Perc McInnis' Stars last night in a rather loose-felding encounter the pace-setters of the City Baseball League won their fourth straight victory from their arch-rivals when they came from behind in the closing innings to capture the 8-6 verdict.

Not as well played as previous Stars-Falcons games nevertheless the game was another closely fought struggle. Stars coming to bat first pushed two runs across the plate on two singles, a sacrifice hit and Falcon error but the losers made it all even in their turn at the plate as Fred Bradley poled out a long drive to left field that went for a homer, scoring Pomp Bolger, who had doubled, from second base.

The winners got one of these back in the fourth to make it 4-3 and then they jumped into a 7-3 lead with a four-run spurge, two errors, one hit and two passed balls doing the damage. But it was the Stars turn to take the air on the third as the Falcons went out in order. Umpire McCabe calling the game as darkness was fast setting in.

The Star victory enabled young Bruce MacCallum. The youngster was not as good as in previous games but he roared down hard in the pinches to quell dangerous looking uprisings. He was touched for six in the six-inning struggle while striking out eight batsmen.

Big George Ayres, Falcon moundsman also yielded but six hits while fanning a like number but committing errors behind him allowed runners to cross the plate at crucial moments. It was another tough break for the big southpaw hurler who like his teammate Ernie Robin appears to have a jinx dogging his footsteps.

Cubs Continue To Gain On Cardinals With Fifth Victory Over Dodgers

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 25.—Chicago Cubs continued their threatening attitude toward the embattled cardinals for the National League lead today by belting over Brooklyn Dodgers for the fifth time in succession, 4-2 at Chicago.

The triumph gave Chicago a record of 16 victories in 19 games against the invading eastern clubs of the circuit and 19 in the last 22 starts.

Tex Carleton turned in a neat five-hit pitching performance to check the Dodgers, giving up only one run in the first six frames, then easing up when the game was safely won. Two doubles by Sam Leslie spoiled a shutout. Sam hit the first in the seventh inning and scored on singles by Danny Taylor and Ralph Boyle. In the eighth he doubled again to drive in Len Koenecke.

Watson Clark was the victim of a three-run rally in the third which decided the game but won the distinction of being the only southpaw except Carl Hubbell of New York Giants to go the route against Chicago this season.

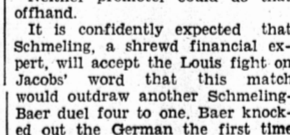

BANK CLERK IS KING OF SCULLERS

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PORT DALHOUSIE, Ont., July 25.—A 27 year old bank clerk from Buffalo, Erwin Konrad, today established himself the king of sprnt scullers on the continent by trouncing Toronto's sensational Argonaut pair, Charlie Campbell and Johnny Coulson, in the 440 yard senior dash that featured the opening program of the Royal Canadian Henley regatta.

At the end of a day in which the fortunes of his Buffalo west side club, United States and Canadian aggregate club champions, had been literally wiped out, the bronzed Konrad went to the starting line turned to a high pitch for the event and pulled into an early lead and held it, driving over the finish line nearly a length in front of Coulson who was second. The time was 1:16.4. Campbell, the senior sculling monarch of two countries, was third, another few feet back.

Earlier in the afternoon Konrad put in an impressive bid for the association singles, winner of which will qualify to face Campbell for the senior title Saturday.

Konrad won the longer distance without greatly exerting himself from R. W. Bates of the Union Boat Club, Boston, and Verdall Price of Brockville, Ont. He finished a length ahead of Bates who also qualified easily. Price falling to get up, Konrad's time was 8:44.8.

The association singles final tomorrow will be an international affair with Konrad and Bates pitted against Coulson, winner of the other preliminary heat today and H. Miller of University of Toronto. Coulson won his heat easily in 8:38.4. Anthony Belyea of Saint John, N. B., was eliminated in the race.

Of the five finals run off on opening day, three triumphs were collected by the powerful Argonauts, most serious challengers for the aggregate honors, won annually since 1932 by the Buffalo oarsmen. Konrad's sprint victory was the single westside win and Detroit Rowing Club's junior 150 pound four won the other event.
