

LLOYDS' INSURANCE AGAINST WAR RISKS

Serves to Show That Uneasy Feeling Exists Over Present Complications

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Jan. 24-The Times says one or two large insurances were effected yesterday at Lloyds in connection with the complications arising out of the situation in northern Europe.

Five per cent was accepted to cover the risk of an outbreak of hostilities between France and Italy within the next four months and six per cent was paid on the risk of an outbreak of war involving France, Germany and this country within the next six months.

The premium on the possibility of an outbreak between Great Britain, France, and Germany, although there is no apparent reason for such an outcome, is six per cent.

LABOR MEETING

(Canadian Press) BIRMINGHAM, Jan. 24-The annual conference of the British labor party has opened.

Ben Turner, President of the conference, stated that the labor unrest secured to benefit the party as had public opinion during the year.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Jan. 24-The Wanderers were beaten by Ottawa in the N. H. A. match tonight 10 to 6.

FOUR NEGROES ARE LYNCHED

(Canadian Press) HAMILTON, Ga., Jan. 23-A mob of 100 men last night broke into the Harris County jail here, overpowered Jailer E. M. Rabbittson, and took four negroes, three men and one woman out and hanged them to trees one mile from the town. The bodies were riddled with bullets. It is estimated that 300 shots were fired.

The negroes were arrested yesterday, charged with the murder of Norman H. Hadley, a well to do farmer. They protested their innocence to the last.

COMMUNICATION THROUGH PROVINCE AND WITH MAINLAND

Yesterday the Earl Grey left Pictou at 7.30 a.m. for Georgetown with 20 passengers. Tuesday's full mail, comprising 100 sacks, express and 10 tons mixed freight, docking at 11.50 a.m.

The passengers, mail and express were brought to this city by special train which arrived at 1.05 p.m. Today the Earl Grey leaves Georgetown for Pictou at 7.00 a.m. with passengers, yesterday's outward mail, express and freight.

WHY SABLES ARE DEARER THIS YEAR

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Jan. 24-Furs are likely to be higher in price, owing to an edict of the Duma of Sept. 23 restricting the hunting of sables in Russia.

At one of the four yearly fur sales held in London yesterday there was much excitement due to the fact that 1,044 Russian sables, the first offered in the public market since the passing of the edict, were to be paid prices high from the start.

CHINA'S TROOPS FAVOR REPUBLIC

TACOMA, Jan. 22-T. B. Neff, a young rancher accidentally shot and killed his 12 year old niece Annabel Bone while hunting rabbits near here today. Overcome by remorse he wrote a note to his sister explaining the tragedy and committed suicide by swallowing strychnine.

HOCKEY PLAYER SERIOUSLY ILL

HALIFAX, Jan. 23-Edger Dey, the Ottawa hockey player, who came here to play with the Crescents, is very seriously ill at the infirmary, where yesterday he was operated for an abscess under the left breast muscle. The abscess resulted from an injury received while playing in the match at which he struck an opposing player. It is said that the blow that caused this injury was given to him almost at the same time that he struck his man and the police stepped in.

Tonight the visitors will be entertained by the Mayor and corporation at a banquet in the King Edward Hotel. Covers will be laid for 200.

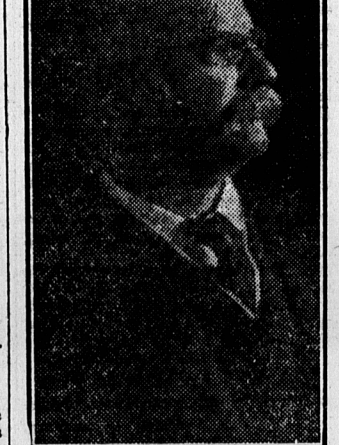

A COUNCIL DISMISSES HEALTH MAN

(Special to The Guardian) HAMPTON, Jan. 24-The first matter before the County Council today was a motion for the dismissal of Dr. F. H. Wetmore as chairman of the Board of Health.

The mover and seconder, Councillors Price and Murray, were called upon to state the cause for their action, but no explanation was forthcoming.

On being pressed, Councillor Price spoke in support of the motion and said there was a feeling that Dr. Wetmore was taking advantage of his position to send big bills to the county.

The motion was carried, thirteen to eight, with several Councillors not voting.

VIRGINIA WOMEN DENIED THE BALLOT

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 23-Women of Virginia were denied the ballot yesterday when the house committee on privileges and elections of the general assembly directed to report adversely on changing the constitution of Virginia so that women might vote. The action of the committee was practically unanimous. It is expected that the bill will come to a vote in either branch over the committee's report.

THE OFFICIAL TOTALS OF THE 1911 ELECTION

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Jan. 24-The Clerk of the Crown in Chancery has issued the official resume of the last election.

The vote was: Conservatives 669,557 Liberals 625,096 Labor 1,742 Socialist 3,912 Independent 7,177.

In P. E. I. the Conservatives numbered 14,638 and the Liberals 13,998.

RICHESON PLEA IS GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

(Canadian Press) BOSTON, Jan. 24-Harry A. Butts, a colored prisoner, shared the cell of C. V. T. Richeson.

He appeared before the criminal court today, retracted his former plea of not guilty and pleading guilty to manslaughter.

BOSTON, Jan. 23-It was learned today that the Rev. John L. Campbell, D. D., pastor of the Central Baptist Church in Cambridge, has at the Charles Street Jail ever since his arrest, and that arrangements are on foot to have Dr. Campbell serve as the doomed preacher's spiritual adviser from now on.

The Rev. Edgar J. Helms, a Methodist Episcopal clergyman, pastor of the Morgan Memorial Chapel on Shawmut avenue, has also been visiting Mr. Richeson. It was he who heard the first confession of the Virginian. It is felt that a clergyman of Mr. Richeson's own denomination would be more appropriate.

TO DIE FOR A BOMB OUTRAGE

SALONKA, Jan. 22-Court martial which is sitting with closed doors at Istik about 90 miles north of here, has condemned to death eight Bulgarians, two Jews, three Gypsies and six Turks in connection with the bomb outrage, which was perpetrated early in December, in the village Mosque causing the death of twelve persons. For an entire week after the crime, the place was in a state of anarchy the Turks averaging the outrage on the Bulgarians, of whom they killed and wounded a large number.

WOULD RETAIN COMMISSIONERS

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Jan. 24-The Premier heard a deputation from the Shipping and Manufacturing interests of Montreal asking for the present members of the harbor board to be retained, and said there should be capable men working in the interests of the national port scheme.

Mr. Coderre, M. P., for Hochelaga, charged the Commissioners with being active Liberal partisans.

ALLEGED COMBINE EXISTS TO CORNER DRESSED POULTRY

NEW YORK, January 22-An appeal to consumers and retailers of meats, issued by a committee here, charges that a number of prominent produce and poultry dealers in New York have entered into a combination to corner the dressed poultry market of the country. The general public, declares the appeal, will be despoiled of millions of dollars this year if the plans of the combination succeed.

NO MORE SUNDAY SLIDING IN TORONTO

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 23-No more Sunday tobogganing in the public parks of Toronto is the fiat. By a vote of 15 to 8, the city council last evening adopted the recommendation of the board of control that a by-law be passed to prohibit the use of slides provided by the city, in public parks on the Lord's Day.
