**MR. JACOB LING**

On Monday evening, March 24, Mr. Jacob Ling of New Glasgow passed peacefully away at his home at the advanced age of 82 years and 23 days. The funeral services which were held at the Christian Church were delayed until the following Saturday to await the arrival of his two daughters, Miss Harriet J. and Mrs. Fred Kellaway from Massachusetts. Rev. Dr. Genge of the Central Christian Church of this city, preached the funeral sermon and the Rev. William Hayter, a former pastor, and very close friend of Mr. Ling, spoke very feelingly of the deceased and his family. The pallbearers were William Hayter, Cyrus Smith, Allan McDonald, Eldon McKay, William Bowen, and Fred Tombs.

Mr. Ling was well known and greatly respected in the community and his funeral was very largely attended. He is survived by four sisters—Mrs. John R.
