NOTES ON THE SIXTH P. E. I. EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE 14th WEEK ENDING FEB. 6TH, 1924

The P. E. I. Egg Laying Contest made a gain of 67 eggs over the previous week's production. 615 eggs were laid during the week. 516 eggs have been laid to date. A marked improvement was noted in production of the heavier breeds. The lighter breeds are coming back to normal.

Experimental Station pen of White Leghorns No. 14 leads the Contest for the week with 48 eggs. The Experimental Station pen of White Leghorns No. 12 second with 46 eggs. The Experimental Station pen of White Leghorns No. 15 third with 44 eggs. Experimental Station pen of White Leghorns No. 13 fourth with 43 eggs. Mr. D. P. MacDonald's Barred Rocks tied with Mrs. Fred McIntyre's White Leghorns for fifth with 35 eggs each. Mr. Howard Roper's White Wyandottes sixth with 34 eggs.
