## The Man Who Broke the Bank

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Sept. 11.—An enterprising young American has reached London from Deuville fresh from his recent prowess in helping to "break the bank" at the Casino there. He is Charles Pusinelli, a prominent figure in the American rubber industry.

He arrived at the Savoy with considerable luggage, but one large portmanteau he carefully retained in his personal possession all the way from France till it was finally deposited in the hotel strong room. This containing bundles of franc notes representing about a million and a half francs which Mr. Pusinelli had cleared from the Casino baccarat tables when the bank temporarily broke under the strain.

"Although not much in the gambling line," he said in an interview, "I found things a bit monotonous watching the visitors passing up and down the promenade or disporting in the waves. I was tempted, therefore, to wide away the time by a look in at the Casino tables.

Before I realized it I began playing fairly heavily until I got sufficiently interested to drop

about 170,000 francs at Chemin de fer. Towards the end of the second day, however, we got on to baccarat, and then my luck turned.

"I made 240,000 francs in one bank, having the surprising luck of 12 winners in succession. "The Chemin de fer stakes were limited to 20,000 francs, but there was no limit the baccarat, so I realised that it was a question of the amount of cash one had available to turn out lucky sooner or later.

"Things hopped along merrily with me, and soon I had sufficient winnings to justify big risks, with the Casino's money instead for I was now, of course, playing of my own. My practise was to start off with about 20,000 francs which, by the way, are put down in cash not counters as at Monte Carlo.

"From the outset my luck seemed to be in, but instead of lifting the winnings straight away I let them lie on the table until they bulked up to 80,000 francs, then I would pocket 30,000, leaving the 50,000 on the game.

"As fortune ran strongly my way, I risked 100,000 now and again when I had a particular "hunch" that I was likely to win. Then I dropped again to 20,000 francs, stakes, which I allowed to double up as usual.

"Generally my luck consisted of winning big coups and losing small ones so that at the end of the third day I had won 800,000 francs for the day.

"My high-water mark was reached about the fifth day when I cleared 1,300,000 francs.

"Then three other players and myself made a big clean up, and the luck seemed to reach quite a number of the smaller players as well, so that at the end of ten days the bank, which had started with 15 million francs, had dropped about 12 millions, and then they decided to "lie off" till they could get some more money from Paris.

## Treasure Trove

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, Sept. 11.—The coroner's inquest on a sum equivalent to \$100 in gold and silver found beside the canal near Winson Green Road, Birmingham, draws attention to the right of the King in common law to anything unclaimed. This right is confined to gold and silver either in plate, bullion, or coin. Treasury notes found in a concealed hoard would not be regarded as "Treasure Trove."

Treasure Trove must have been something deliberately concealed.

The coroner's duty is to hold an inquest to find out if possible the name of the owner.

The central authority for the administration of Treasure Trove is the Treasury. Some of the most plentiful finds have been due to the scare of an invasion by Napoleon, over a hundred years ago. That led timid persons to hide their coin, plate, and bullion.

Of recent years cases of discovery have grown fewer about three or four a year.

A few years ago at Ellesmere Port, Cheshire, some little boys were playing at "Winding the Lucky Stone." One dug up an unexpected tin containing sovereigns and half sovereigns. There was the anciently prescribed inquest and the boys were suitably rewarded.

For the last 40 years or so it has been the custom to send coins found in this way to the British

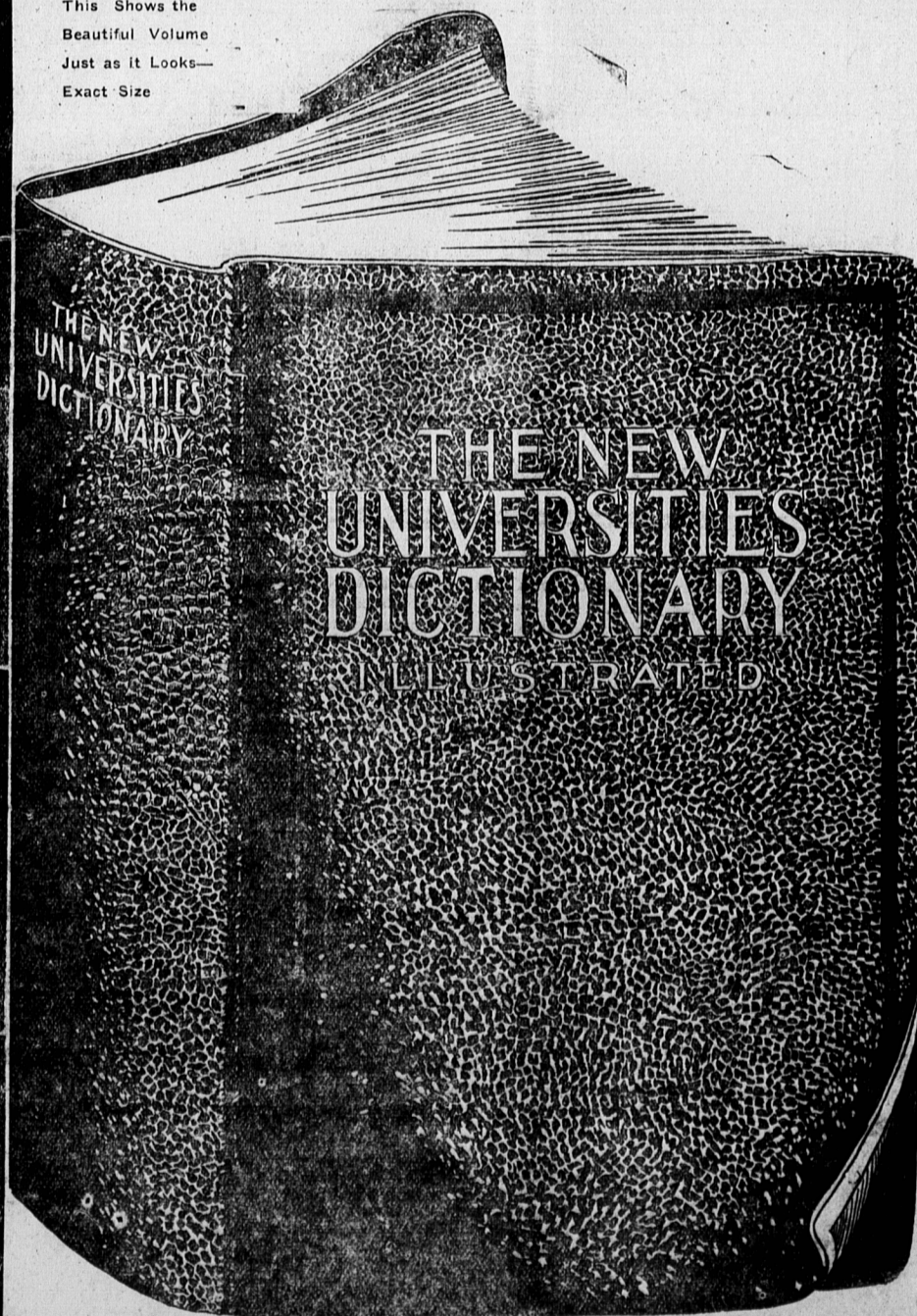
