WHAT is a pound and linen party, such as the Ladies' Aid of the P. E. I. Hospital, propose to hold? In brief those attending or sending to the party are supposed to bring with them or send each, a pound or more of some article which is ordinarily sold by the pound, and which can be used in the Hospital, or, some article of linen such as would be useful there. Not less than a pound, remember, but as many pounds as you like and the more the better. Tea, coffee, sugar, tapioca, sago, spices and anything for the pantry or larder, come within the pound class. Table linen, bed linen, towels, toilet covers, bed spreads, etc. will come in under the linen class. Contributors to pound class are free to donate to the linen class as well. Among other and miscellaneous articles needed at the new P. E. I. Hospital are, tumblers, sick-feeders, teapots and stands, cups and saucers, cream pitchers all sizes, meat plates, vegetable dishes, porridge bowls, knives, forks, spoons, pepper and salt dishes, and china and crockery of all kinds, enameled ware, saucepans, kettles, pails, basins, trays, whisks, cheese-cloth, gray blankets, white flannel, flannellette etc. These are suggestions to help out the donors in their selections. Any of the articles named, or other articles of utility will be accepted with thanks and appreciation.
