PREFONTAINE A PROTECTIONIST.

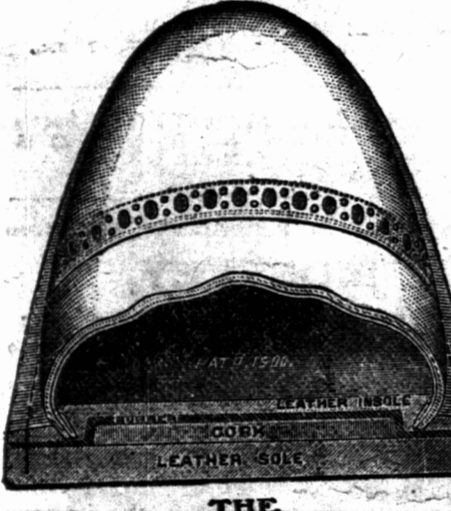

BAD MEAT WAS SENT TO AFRICA

And Canadian Samples Were Worst of All

VIEW A GOVERNMENT ANALYST

So Declares - Ottawa Waiting to Hear From England About the Cattle Embargo.

POOR CANADIAN CANNED MEAT.

OTTAWA, Dec. 2. (Special) - The report of the Government Analyst at the Cape of Good Hope shows canned meat sent by Canada during the South African War was very poor.

ONLY ONE THIRD GOOD.

Of 94 samples analyzed 32 were sound, 32 slightly decomposed and thirty decomposed.

Compared with the canned meats from other countries the showing was very bad.

THE CATTLE EMBARGO.

There is no change in the cattle embargo situation. The Minister of Agriculture is still waiting for a reply from the Imperial authorities as to their views regarding bonding through Maine.

CANNONSHIP FROM BOSTON.

For the present shipments clearing from Boston for St. John and Halifax to load are prohibited.

MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION. IN SESSION

Appreciative Reference to Late Geo. Bryenton

A PUBLIC MEETING HELD

In the Cornwall Church in the Evening - Full of Interest Instruction and Enthusiasm.

The Preacher's Association met in the Vestry of Cornwall Church, last Monday at 3.30 p. m. with the Rev. R. Opie in the chair, also Revs. J. W. McConnell, W. B. Thomas, Thos. Hicks and Joseph Parkins; Messrs. John T. Mellish, Henry Rackham, Geo. Carter and John Edwards. In addition to the regular business of the Association, some time was spent in kindly and appreciative references to the sterling qualities of the late George Bryenton of Brackley Point Road, and also to the long and useful services of the now deceased as a Local Preacher. The Revs. R. Opie and Thos. Hicks were appointed a committee to convey to the late George Bryenton's family the Association's high appreciation of the life and labors of their now departed brother. At 5.45 p. m. the Association adjourned to meet in Grace Church, Charlottetown, on Monday the 2nd day of March next.

At 7 p. m. a public meeting was held in the Cornwall church, under the auspices of the Association. The Rev. Richard Opie presided, and the following program was carried out: Opening prayer the Rev. Joseph Parkins; Address by John T. Mellish on Island Methodism; The speaker followed very clearly and instructively, the progress of Methodism, from the day of the arrival of the late Benjamin Chappelle, in New London (who was the first Methodist on P. E. I.) to the present day. The Rev. Thos. Hicks followed with an address on Canadian Methodism. The Rev. Mr. Hicks in a telling address, indicated the progress of Methodism in Canada between the years 1818 and 1902. The Rev. J. W. McConnell gave an inspiring address on the Ecumenical Council held in City Road Chapel, London, Eng., in Sept. 1901. Among other remarkable statements and statistics, Mr. McConnell said that the increase in the membership of world wide Methodism, between 1891 and 1901 was 1,115,000. Also references were made to the Missionary Ecumenical Conference held in New York. Then followed two remarkably able addresses on Temperance by Messrs. John Edwards and Henry Rackham, two veterans in the temperance cause. The choir greatly aided the meeting with suitable music. The Rev. W. B. Thomas spoke on behalf of the St. James' Relief Fund, and a collection was taken for the St. James Church relief fund.

The meeting throughout was full of interest, instruction and enthusiasm. It is not often, that so much information and inspiration are pressed into the same space of time.

INTERESTING LECTURE OF REV. MOSS

On Nature and the Supernatural Last Night.

MANY VIEWS OF NATURE

Analyzed and Discussed - Pantheism and Christian Pantheism - A Pleased Audience.

Rev. W. T. G. Moss had a fine audience in St. James Hall last evening to hear his lecture on Nature and the Supernatural, of which the following is a synopsis:

Of course human nature is included. Man and his environment are inextricably intertwined. Separate the two and the universe remains a mystery. Put together, man is the key which unlocks the door of the physical world, and the world riddle yields itself to solution. There are many attitudes toward nature.

1. Materialism is one. That is the attitude which regards the world for what it can get out of it. Nature is a place to grow crops and herds and to do business in.

2. Materialistic Science regards nature as a field of research. There are two kinds of materialistic scientists. Those who are Atheistic and those who are Agnostic. The former declares that the supernatural hasn't put in an appearance that the "Great Companion," spoken of by prophet and saint and poet, is dead, that the world is the triumph only of force. The Agnostic expresses only his grave and sad doubt:

Oa from room to room I stray, And my host can ne'er espy; And I know not to this day Whether Guest or Captive I."

3. The mechanical theory of the universe which prevailed from the fifth to the nineteenth century regards the matter in this way: "Nature is a great machine, made as a boy makes a top, and spun about as a boy spins his top. Since it exists some One must exist Who made it. Man is part of this machine and had better do his work and mind his business. He will get his reward if he behaves, and at any rate he is sure of punishment. The supernatural according to this is only an inference.

4. The Ascetic regards the world as only a stopping place on the way to his home. The Mediaevalist and the Puritan regarded the world as a very evil place. The former thought that evil befallen the soul of man under the guise of beauty, and that the less he had to do with the pleasures of the world the better for him. His ideal was the monastery. But Asceticism - beautiful in its way - is only a materialistic conception of the world. That is to say, it finds nothing here worthy of God.

5. The conception which finds favor now days is this: That nature is the home of the supernatural. The world is the triumph of the Incarnation and is a perpetual miracle. This is the attitude of Pantheism. But there is Hindu Pantheism and there is Christian. That is to say: it is theistic. It leaves room for the personality of God and the individuality of men, and it exonerates the Deity in regard to the problem of evil.

HE FAVORS LEGISLATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2. (Special) - The President's message was delivered today in Congress and deals with the trusts, the tariff, the Isthmian Canal and other topics.

HE URGES LEGISLATION.

He strongly urges legislation regarding large corporations. He also favors the building of the Isthmian Canal.
