MCINTYRE EVADES QUESTION

the first speaker of the evening, reviewed the expenditures in his own department as evidence that the Government had not been "extravagant." He read over the Conservative policy, arguing that it contained "nothing new."

Mr. McIntyre's alibi for the Government's failure to secure a subsidy settlement was that the Premiers of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia would not co-operate. He "really had to laugh" he said, when he read the Conservative policy of special attention to roads, leading to shipping centres, as this was what he had been doing all along.

Mr. McIntyre maintained that he had tabled "all the tenders and correspondence" in connection with the purchase of \$90,000 of road machinery.

A total saving in road work of \$208,000 had been made with these machines, he declared.

Mr. McIntyre complained that the Guardian's criticism of the cracks in the McIntyre highway was an "injustice." He admitted that the portion built last fall had cost more money than it should. "The portion built this year was built 'at about \$10,000 less per mile.' \$80,000 of the federal highway grant had been spent in the vicinity of Charlottetown, the balance on other work throughout the Province.

"There was never a Government in our history that did as much work and did it at such little cost," he boasted.

Mr. McIntyre's explanation of the sinking fund provision to pay off the highway borrowings was as follows:

"If you borrowed \$200 from me and you had an income of \$50 a year and out of that income you took \$10 and placed it away in a box, at the end of twenty years you would have \$200 in the box and you could pay back what you owed me and it wouldn't cost the people a cent."

Mr. H. H. Cox, whose address was largely made up of bitterly partisan criticism against the Bennett Government admitted the force of Mr. McEwen's criticism of the condition of the road from Mt. Stewart to Charlottetown. "It is not very good," he said, adding that the Government could not be expected to do everything.

The Guardian, he said, was "in mourning" over the McIntyre highway. He drove over the highway and "couldn't find a crack in it."

The only road machinery the Conservatives had, he contended, was "a little machine which they used to call Peters' hearse."

"Put us in for another four years and we'll have those roads so that they won't cost us a quarter of what they are costing now—and then we'll start to pay off the debt," he said.

The audience laughed.

"What more can a local government do than roads, he asked. "There is not much more, except Education of course, and we've done all those things."

Mr. Cox, in attempting to quiz his opponents "promises" was promptly brought to book by Mr. McEwen who retorted: "Settle your own promises first." (Applause.)

MR. MCDONALD'S SPEECH

Emphasizing the serious importance of local issues at the present time, Mr. J. B. MacDonald made a splendid impression on the audience by his obvious sincerity and conviction. Scoring Mr. Cox for his contemptuous references to the Dominion Government, he pointed out the necessity of having a Provincial Government that would be in sympathy with the progressive measures which the Bennett Government is adopting to cope with the serious economic situation.

Mr. McIntyre had boasted of the low debt of the Province. To whom was that due, Mr. MacDonald asked triumphantly, but to the Conservative party, adding, amid applause,

that if the present Government was long in power there would be no such record to talk about.

Glaring instances of extravagances on the roads were cited by Mr. MacDonald. During his campaign he had seen fifteen persons following one road machine. In another place two men and two carts were moving gravel a distance of a few feet. In another instance a Liberal heeler had received \$200 for cutting brush in the middle of winter with a hatchet—an example of the manner in which the federal unemployed grant had been distributed. Another instance occurred at Midgeall bridge, where an old man of between eighty and eighty-five years of age, with hundreds of acres of land and a large bank account, had been employed at \$5 a day. This old gentleman was so deaf that the instructions had to be given to an understrapper who was paid \$2.50 a day while the "boss" held his position for no other reason than because he was a Liberal heeler. (Applause.)

Convincing evidence of the economical administration under the Stewart Government, as shown by the expenditures in the Public Accounts, was cited by the Conservative candidate, who compared these expenditures with the Leas Government's record. He also pointed out that the Liberals have given no assurance that they mean to retain the Prohibition Act, although they campaigned so strongly in its favor at the last election.

Mr. McIntyre, at the Good Roads convention, had intimated his intention of beginning an extensive program of highway improvement all over the province. "Why doesn't the Minister stand up on the platform tonight, like a man feeling the position he occupies, and say that that is his intention, that if returned to power he intends to borrow millions of dollars to make a macadamized road all over the province," Mr. MacDonald challenged, while the audience applauded.

"Why doesn't he say whether or not that is his platform?"

Citing the report of the Education Commission, prepared at a cost of over \$3,000 to the taxpayers of the Province, Mr. MacDonald again scored when he said there was one recommendation in this report, to change the hour of holding the annual school meetings, and that this

was the only recommendation that the Leas Government had implemented.

Hon. Mr. McIntyre, in rebuttal, denied that there was any more work in progress on the roads this year than last year. He promised that the Leas Government would "find ways and means to take advantage of old age pensions."

The Government member's endeavor to tell the audience that the Bennett Government was taxing the Province "a million dollars" met with prompt denials from his hearers.

"Where do you get that statement?" he was asked derisively.

MR. MCINTYRE: "We are one hundredth part of the Dominion, and Mr. Bennett had to raise \$95,000,000."

VOICE: \$75,000,000.

"BOSS" GILLIS TO PUBLISH NEWSPAPER

NEWBURYPORT, July 26.—Andrew J. "Boss" Gillis, Newburyport's "Bad Boy" mayor, has entered the publishing field so that he can shoot back at any newspapers who "take a rap" at him. He has purchased the Newburyport Commercial Press and today he went to New York to purchase a high speed press. His publication will make its initial appearance Saturday.

His newspaper, he said, will be "unbridled." "I will give the public the facts without censorship," he announced, adding that he might have to print it on asbestos.

Mayor Gillis' decision to enter the newspaper field was the result of his recent announcement that he would not seek re-election. Comment on this announcement, however, caused him to change his mind, and he announced he would seek re-election, with his own newspaper support.

The mayor has not yet decided whether his newspaper will be a daily or weekly publication. He has retained John H. McAuliffe, of Lynn as editor.

POTATO PRICE RANGE IS \$25 TO \$80 TON

VICTORIA, B.C., July 23.—The original view that farmers of British Columbia had sold their early potato crops at low prices was confirmed by the potato price inquiry which is being conducted by officials of the provincial department of agriculture.

The inquiry disclosed price spreads ranging all the way from \$25 per ton to \$89 per ton between coast export points and prairie receiving points. Hon. William Atkinson, minister of agriculture for the province, was informed in a wire Thursday from federal officials in Saskatchewan that the "only explanation of the high price in Saskatchewan is that there is no local old stock there and jobbers are taking all the public can stand."
