Turner, was reported destroyed in an air raid on Bremen in 1942, a second original is in the museum's possession. The Bremen version, they said, was painted first, but caught fire during the bombing. Regina Boasts Puppet Romeo

REGINA, Oct. 22.—(CP)—When Punch and Judy character toward the wings and Romeo and Juliet glide upstage in the realm of puppetry, the change will in part be caused by the efforts of a Regina grandmother.

Mrs. Ella M. Davis, who has been at puppet making and performing for some eight years, has switched her efforts from wild western plays to the Shakespearean drama and says the latter gives her much more pleasure.

She constructed her own puppet theatre and does the dialogue of all characters with her own voice as well as manipulating all the puppets.

"Romeo and Juliet may not be for children but some people sad serious drama could not be successful with puppets and I think I am succeeding," said Mrs. Davis, who was born at Florence, Ont., and came here 25 years ago.

Scenery and characters of the "Romeo and Juliet" in the Shakespearean classic are complete and she has memorized all the dialogue. Friends have witnessed a performance of the drama in her front parlour where her theatre is set up.

The western play she wrote and produced for children last year, soon became boring to her but she never tires of Shakespeare.

Mrs. Davis' interest in puppetry was first aroused when she was a child in Detroit. There she became acquainted with a family of professional puppeteers and she used puppets in their attic became the child's dolls.

Built Own Stage
But it was not until six years ago that she first constructed her own puppet stage. Since then she has given many performances for her friends at home and last year she put on a show at the local Y.M.C.A. Her earliest performances, and still in her repertoire, are folk dances by gaily-costumed figures. One specialty is a Russian dancer who gives her performance to the accompaniment of a recorded version of a Latvian folk song, "The Poppy". Mrs. Davis finds that the music of composers such as Tchaikowsky are too intricate for puppet work. A well-punctuated rhythm is required.

Her only professional engagement was when a group of children sold tickets for a show at a local hall and Mrs. Davis received enough money to pay for costs of constructing the puppet theatre.

Forms of the puppets are first modelled from plasticine and used to make a mould of clay. From the clay mould the actual papier mache puppets are made.

Work on the costumes is intricate. Detail must be exact yet the general effect is of the most importance. Designing of scenery comes easily to Mrs. Davis for she has been an active stage designer for many years in amateur and children's theatricals in Regina.

She will be entertaining her grandchildren with the western play this winter but will be "diligent" to put on "Romeo and Juliet" for any group that requests it.

Link Argentine Spy With Ship Losses

MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—(CP)—The Montreal Daily Star said today in a newspaper story that it has learned authoritatively that Royal Canadian Mounted Police have been asked to investigate the possibility that German sinking of Canadian ships in the St. Lawrence River resulted from information supplied by an Argentine spy.

The Argentine was identified as Teodoro Erdmann Lau, 44, who was arrested in the United States last week on his arrival from Canada and arraigned on espionage charges. The F. B. I. said then he was paymaster of a spy ring which relayed sufficient information to Germany before it was uncovered in 1941 to account for the sinking of at least 12 allied ships.

The mystery of the disappearance of Warren Penny, 52-year-old machine shop foreman, deepened when his car was found Sunday in the Mira district, 12 miles from here stripped of accessories Penny was last seen early Saturday night when he left home to visit a brother.

The other missing man, Charles Shaheen, 49, strayed away from three hunting companions in the woods of Framboise 50 miles south of here last Friday. Police dogs have been used in the vain search for Shaheen.

BLAME FOR HIGH PRICES FOLLOWS POLITICAL BENT

TORONTO, Oct. 23.—Opinion amongst Canadians as to what is responsible for rising prices differs mainly in line with their political leanings.

In varying degree, the public attributes high prices to strikes and high wages, shortages and hoarding, tariffs and profiteering with that perennial scapegoat, "the Government," heading the list.

The question on which the Institute polled a carefully balanced cross-section of voters in all parts of Canada was:

"Where do you place the blame for present high prices in Canada?"
