MISS MACMILLAN's recital has been postponed indefinitely.

In a letter to the Halifax Chronicle, a writer in advocating an Experimental Farm and Agricultural College, says: "The question of an agricultural school and model farm is a matter of provincial concern, and more. In order that we have a school worthy of the name, organized and equipped as well as the best in the Dominion, would it not be better for Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island to unite? If this can be done then we will have the strength and support of the three provinces to guarantee the success and permanence of the undertaking. Then we will have a first-class up-to-date agricultural school and model farm that the people of the maritime provinces can point to with pride. The question of locality is not germane to the discussion at this stage. First, let the provinces agree as to the necessity for such an institution, and determine on giving it united support. When this is done and a full commitment of all interested is made beyond withdrawal, then the question of locality can be considered, and failing to agree a provision in the scheme can be made, whereby disinterested persons can be chosen to make the selection."

DEATH OF ARCH D. MACMILLAN.

A Telegram to the Effect Received Yesterday Evening.

THE exceptionally sad news was received here yesterday evening by telegram to Hon. Angus Macmillan, of the death of his son, Archibald Macmillan, which occurred at Marlin, Texas, U.S., on Jan. 31st. There were no particulars.

In his last letter to his sister, Isobel Macmillan, of this city, a short time ago, he stated that he was just recovering from an attack of malarial fever and Miss Macmillan was about writing for him to return home when fully recovered. His death is probably due to the effects of this dreaded disease.

Mr. Archibald Macmillan was but in the prime of life, being in his 42nd year. In his boyhood days he was a beloved schoolmate. After a successful course of studies in the Grammar School, Summerside, he entered Prince of Wales College where he distinguished himself, as an exceedingly clever and bright scholar. From the college he graduated with honors and shortly afterwards he took a course in a business college in St. John, N. B. when he again graduated. He always loved study and was forever at his books. Success crowned every effort and his scholarly career was a brilliant one throughout. His mind was bent on law and after a complete course in Harvard Law College he graduated with honors.

He practised law in Denver, Colorado for a short time until his health failed and he returned to his home in Summerside.

During his life Mr. Macmillan had travelled extensively, visiting many parts of Europe and the North American continent. Last September he went to Marlin, Texas where he remained until his death.

In social life Mr. Macmillan was a delightful companion, being well informed in all the public questions of the day and being a brilliant conversationalist he was always listened to with pleasure. Full of wit and humor, he was a cheerful entertainer and a host in himself. On the platform his figure was always welcomed and his speeches were racy and spirited.

At home he was a kind and affectionate son and brother and was very dearly beloved. In politics he differed from his father but together in the most friendly spirit, known best in the home circle, and with the best wishes for each other he and his father would start from their home to enter the campaign.

In Summerside, where he was best known, Archibald Macmillan was looked upon as a citizen worthy of high esteem and his death will be regretted by the community in general.

The blow is an almost unbearable one to his father and sister who looked upon him as their best beloved and to them their many friends all over the province will extend their deepest sympathy, in which THE GUARDIAN joins.

Word was forwarded to have the remains embalmed and sent home. The funeral will be taken charge of by the Oddfellows.
