THE GRIPPING STORY OF DR. JEKYLL AND MR HYDE NOW BEING SHOWN, OTHER FEATURES.

At the Strand Theatre yesterday a feature extraordinary was shown—a new version of Robert Louis Stevenson's wonderful story of a man's dual nature, "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde." This story is one of the best known in recent English literature and depicts how Dr. Jekyll could by means of a magic fluid transform himself into the repulsive Mr. Hyde. The story has been changed and brought up to date in its setting and is also made to end differently from the manner in which it was originally written by Stevenson, the whole thing turning out to be a dream.

The film photography is exceedingly good and the acting shows that Sheldon Lewis has made a careful and intelligent study of his dual role. In his portrayal there is displayed an ability to get at the essence of nobility in Jekyll quite as well as the hideous perversion of Hyde. Dr. Jekyll in this story is made to completely survive his baser self.

The story may be briefly summed up as follows: Dr. Jekyll is a philanthropic London physician chiefly engaged in experimental chemistry. His absorption in work of the laboratory, and among poor patients causes him to neglect his fiancée, Bernice Lanyon, until she is forced to seek the company of others. He promises to make good, but is detained by the singular disease of a child. He saves the child at the risk of losing his social friends. In the course of his experiments he comes upon a chemical compound which distorts human personality. The same chemical taken in the perverted personality proves an antidote, converting back to normal personality. Jekyll experiments on himself in proof of his theory that there is no such thing as a soul. Changed to Mr. Hyde, he becomes destructive monster committing arson and murder until he is the terror of London. Bernice breaks the engagement and Jekyll takes on his baser nature out of despair. Changing back and forth he gains power to transform himself at will. Now his misdeeds become more terrible until, as Mr. Hyde, he is widely sought by the police. He has, as Dr. Jekyll, provided for his security as Mr. Hyde, but, one by one, bits of circumstantial evidence lead to his trial and conviction. All the horrors and suffering of remorse become his in jail when he is transformed to Dr. Jekyll. He is led to exception when he wakes up from a trance to find that the worst of his experiences are but the baseless fabric of a dream. The

TO TAKE ACTION AGAINST CERTAIN FRATERNAL SOCIETIES.

OTTAWA, July 26.—It is understood that the Government contemplates taking action against certain fraternal benefit societies which have not been complying with amendments to the Insurance Act, which came into force in January 1, 1920. Only one fraternal company has brought itself completely under scope of the Act by obtaining an unconditional license based on a certificate of actuarial solvency. The amendments to the Act, which are being violated, require that only societies which can furnish certificates of solvency shall be licensed.

RUSSIANS THREATEN VENGEANCE AGAINST BRITISH AND FINNS.

LONDON, July 24.—A Bolshevik wireless despatch from Moscow received here tonight threatens vengeance against the British and Finns, should Great Britain deport Sarteri Nuorteva, once secretary to C. A. K. Martens, the Russian Bolshevik representative in the United States, to Finland and harm should befall him. The wireless communication says: "With reference to the arrest of Nuorteva and the British decision to deliver him to Finland where he has been condemned to death, the Soviet Government has decided that in the event this infamous act is perpetrated, all British prisoners of war in Russia, the Ukraine and Azerbaijan will similarly suffer and that should Finland harm Nuorteva, punishment a hundred times severe will be meted out to the Finns. The Soviet Government notifies the British and Finnish authorities that they will receive a lesson and be taught to be wise."

QUEBEC, July 26.—The steamer Canadian Recruit which went ashore at Vache Pointe, near Tadoussac, last December, and was recently refloated was towed here today from Tadoussac by the tug Lord Strathcona. She will go into dock for repairs.
