RETURN HOME—Mr. J. Lester Douglas, exporter, accompanied by H. B. and B. Douglas of the C. N. R., have returned from an enjoyable motor trip to Boston. While in Boston, Mr. J. Lester combined business with pleasure and in conversation with several buyers gleaned the information that there would be a good demand for Prince Edward Island turnips of good quality this season, but it is rather early to anticipate prices. He found everyone with whom he came in contact taking a great interest in the Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa and anxiously awaiting the outcome.

"I believe that the bottom has been reached, and that indications point to the turning of the road," stated Mr. J. A. MacLeod, Toronto, General Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, in an interview with The Guardian last evening on the subject of existing economic conditions.

Mr. MacLeod, who attended the centenary celebration of the Bank of Nova Scotia held a few days ago at Halifax, is taking the opportunity of re-visiting the province of his birth. He is accompanied by Mrs. MacLeod and by Mr. Gordon Crawford, manager of one of the branches in Toronto. The party, which arrived in the city yesterday, is leaving on return to Toronto tomorrow. During the interview Mr. MacLeod remarked on the necessity of extreme caution in making statements. He said: "While one should not be too optimistic, nevertheless some improvement may be expected in price of primary commodities. I do not look, however, for any pronounced improvement in general conditions. I believe we have still a considerable way to go before we emerge from the present depression."

PROMINENT VISITORS—Rev. Bruce D. Knott and Mrs. Knott of Saint John, N. B. have been spending two weeks in the Province. Mr. Knott is one of the leading clergymen of Saint John. He is at present president of St. John Evangelical Alliance and the Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Free Masons. He is a popular speaker at the service clubs and societies. He was the special speaker at the Baptist Church Sunday and was heard by a large congregation. Rev. P. S. Crossman, B. A., of Tryon and the Rev. Alec Crowe, B. A., of Bedeque came into the Baptist Church and ministry during Mr. Knott's pastorate at Truro. While on the island he has preached at both Tryon and Bedeque. Rev. and Mrs. Knott are delighted with the beauties of the Province and hope to make a more extended stay another year.

WEDNESDAY INCREASED PAYMENT INCOME TAX—A comparative statement of net collections received during the four months of the fiscal year, July 1931, July 1932 shows an increase of \$16,842.43 for Charlottetown, the figures being—1931-32 \$28,225.81, 1932-33, \$45,068.24.

SUSTAINED INJURIES—Mr. Duncan McNevin, New Haven, sustained several severe cuts on his head and received a bad shaking up when he fell off a load of hay late yesterday afternoon. The injured man was brought to the City for medical attention, and is now resting comfortably in the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

The Diocesan Assembly of the Eucharistic Congress opened last evening at the parish church, Miscouche, and was attended by all the priests of the diocese, and a large number of parishioners from all over the province. His Excellency Rt. Rev. Joseph O'Sullivan, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown accompanied His Excellency Most Rev. G. Courchesne, D.D., Bishop of Rimouski, to Miscouche. With them were Rev. Clair, C.S.S.R., of Toronto, Secretary to His Grace Archbishop McNeill, and Rev. P. McMahon, D.D., Secretary to His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan. They were met at St. Eleanor's by members of the clergy and parishioners. They proceeded in procession through triumphal arches of evergreens to the historic parish of Miscouche.

Preceding the procession were mounted police, one in front on a white horse, and two on black horses. The Miscouche band marched in front of the Bishop's car and played stirring music under the direction of the bandmaster, Mr. Poirier.

Among others attending was a sister of His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan, of the Order of St. Joseph, of Hamilton, Ont. She was accompanied by a Sister of the same order. The Mother Provincial of the Order of Notre Dame, Charlottetown was present besides six Sisters of Martha and two Sisters of Our Lady of Africa.

GOLF DANCE—The Maritime Senior Golf Association entertained the Charlottetown Golf Club at an informal dance held last evening at the Canadian National Hotel. The guests were unanimous in their opinion that the function was one of the most enjoyable of its kind ever held here. The Canadian National Orchestra under the leadership of Miss Kathleen Horiby rendered music for the occasion. Mr. A. R. Cobb, Halifax, provided an interesting feature in sleight of hand tricks, card tricks, and in playing the musical saw. An interesting colour contrast was formed by the red blazers and white trousers worn by the members of the Senior Golf Association. A buffet luncheon was served. The annual dinner of the Association will be held this evening.

LOBSTER SEASON OPENS—At midnight on Monday, the lobster season on the South Shore opened and the fishermen started out with their traps. The lovely moonlight night was ideal for their task. Some waited until dawn, but most of the fishermen got underway shortly after midnight. The lobster factories have opened up in preparation for the first catch. It is said there are twice as many boats out this year than heretofore. There are about 30 boats at Borden, 25 at Cape Traverse, 9 at Chelton and 30 at Victoria. These are mostly local fishermen, but there are a great many from Canso and Antigonish. Fifteen boats were lying ready in Summerside harbour. Along the coast from Fifteen Point and Egmont Bay to West Point there are over two hundred boats. The fishermen are looking forward to a good season.—S.

At a meeting yesterday of the Provincial Government the regulations were rescinded which had previously been passed under authority of the Electrical Inspection Act, 1932.

The Act, passed at the last session of the Legislature, had been introduced at the request of the Board of Fire Underwriters for the alleged purpose of minimizing fire hazards and other risks arising from electrical inspection. It provided for conformity to the Canadian Electrical Code of all electrical installation and electrical work done in the province, for the appointment of an inspector, recommended by the Board, to carry out the provisions of the Act, and for regulations by order-in-council governing electrical inspection, the qualification of mechanics and contractors engaged in electrical work in the Province, the issuing of licenses and permits thereto, etc.

Action to rescind the regulations was taken after many complaints had been received and considered from citizens in various parts of the province of alleged inconvenience and expense out of proportion to the benefits received.

LEFT PROVINCE—Mr. Angus L. MacDonald, Halifax, leader of Nova Scotia Liberals, with Mrs. MacDonald, left the Province yesterday to return home. On Monday Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald motored to the Island from Halifax and proceeded to Tignish, the old home of Mr. MacDonald's mother. She was a daughter of the late Hon. S. F. Perry, for many years a prominent figure in the political life of this province, being a member of the Provincial and Federal Parliaments.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE OCCURRED AT BRUDENELL—A destructive fire occurred at Brudenell about two miles from Montague yesterday afternoon about 3.30 when the dwelling house, two barns, a pump house, and a number of smaller buildings, the property of Mr. Ira McLaren were completely destroyed by fire. The barns had recently been filled with the season's crop of hay, all of which was completely destroyed. Some of the household furnishings were saved, but a large quantity was destroyed.

The loss was partly covered by insurance.

Tragedy quickly followed on the heels of a jolly berry picking picnic at Murray River on Wednesday night. James Hume and William Matheson, of Iris, drove to Murray River with their families on a berry picking frolic. After filling their pails, etc., they decided to stop at McLure's Mill Pond to fish, their families to send back for them later in the evening. When this was done, no trace of the men could be found and only the up-turned boat told of the tragedy which had occurred some time between five and eight o'clock. Thursday, at daybreak grappling was continued and the two bodies were found caught in the fishing lines about twenty feet from the boat.

Mr. Hume leaves a wife and three children. Mr. Matheson is a returned man. They were both about 36 years old.

Dr. Grant, Coroner, Montague, was summoned and after viewing the remains, decided an inquest was unnecessary.

Charmed with the climate and summer beauty of Prince Edward Island, eight visiting Ontario ladies arrived at Beach Grove Inn last evening and are proceeding today to Cavendish.
