Burned To Death

PLESSISVILLE, Que., Dec. 22 — (CP) — Three children were burned to death and their parents and another daughter were taken to hospital early Saturday when fire destroyed their home in this eastern township centre.

The victims were Andre and Germaine Pepin and another son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Pepin. The father, an insurance agent here, the mother and 13-year-old Cecile Pepin suffered severe burns.

Cause of the blaze, which began about 1 a.m., was not known but the fire is believed to have started in the furnace room.

The family had returned from Quebec City, where Andre was a student, only a few hours earlier.

HINTS ON SERVING EGGS AND CHEESE

Hard-boiled eggs either plain or devilled are almost standard accompaniment in a picnic basket and also often make up the substantial portion of the summer salad for lunch at home.

Eggs cooked in the shell should never be hard boiled. The water should not actually boil, but be kept just below boiling temperature for 30 minutes, then both yolk and white will be firm but tender.

The home economists of the Agriculture Department Consumer Section say that if the time is not checked in advance there is any doubt about the eggs being hard enough, they can be tested by piercing with a toothpick through the shell and into the centre of the egg. If the toothpick comes out clean the egg is just right for a devilled egg. If any white adheres to the toothpick the egg should be left in the hot water for a minute or two longer.

To prevent a dark ring around the yolk, cool hard cooked eggs quickly in cold water. If eggs are cooked in advance and stored in the refrigerator they may be mixed with raw ones. Cooked eggs will spin like a top if twirled on the kitchen table while raw ones will just wobble.

To vary devilled eggs add a pinch of curry powder, a few chopped chives or a little powdered bay

leaf to the salad dressing when creaming the yolks.

The Food Information Committee has this to say about the proper care of eggs—designated to get the greatest value out of each egg and so make more available for shipment to starving lands:

Keep eggs fresh by keeping them cool and away from strong flavoured foods.

Left-over egg yolks may be

dropped in a pan of simmering water and hard-cooked. They may also be kept uncooked for a day or two if covered with water in a closed container and kept cold.

Use all of every egg. Scrape out the shells.

Cheese is another food which we are sending overseas in large quantities and, while there is not the desperate need for it that there is for wheat, meat and fats, every bit


that can be saved is that much more to feed the world's hungry. Keep cheese wrapped tightly and cool to prevent moulding and drying. A cloth dampened with vinegar makes a good wrapping for cheddar cheese.

A wedge-shaped piece of hard cheese may be placed on a plate and the exposed surface covered with wax paper pressed on with a cool iron.
