—A STRIKING CONTRAST.—A very graphic method of showing the way the cost of living has been reduced during the last few months has been taken by R. T. Holman, Limited, who are showing in their grocery window, two collections of household supplies, both priced at the same amount. At one side of the window there is shown a bag of sugar and a bag of potatoes, which sold in 1920 for \$30.25. At the other side is shown the same size bag of potatoes, the same size bag of sugar with a seven pound tin of marmalade, a quarter barrel bag of flour, six cakes soap, a five pound tin of syrup, a five pound tin of jam, a pound of baking powder, a five pound bag of rice, four pounds of lard, two pounds of tea, two dozen eggs, six cans of condensed milk, six cans corn, two packages of pancake flour, one package of rolled oats, six cans tomatoes, 10 pounds of beans, six cans of peas three packages of puffed rice, three packages of cornflakes. This latter assortment sells for less than the smaller collection of 1920, today at Holman's.

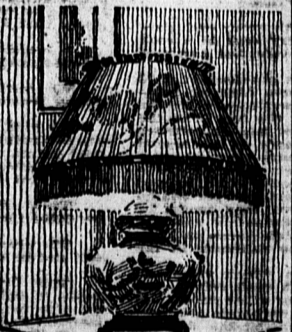
