**MAIL TRAIN DELAYED**—Owing to a collision between the Maritime Express and another train between Montreal and Quebec on Friday afternoon, the Maritime train was cancelled and the Ocean Limited from Montreal was delayed about six hours. As a consequence the Prince Edward Island train no. 40, was sent over in two sections, the first section arriving about nine o'clock Saturday night, with only the parcel mail. The other section left Moncton at 4 o'clock yesterday morning and arrived in Charlottetown about

ten. It brought over the largest mail so far of the Christmas season. The postal clerks were engaged practically all day Sunday in getting mail ready for delivery this morning. To meet the traffic situation the railway officials ran a special train on Sunday from Emerald through Tignish, so that all passengers and mails could be forwarded to their destination without extra delay.

**ICE BUSHING**—On many of the bays and rivers in the province the guide bushes for ice travel have made their appearance. The Highway Superintendents in each locality, representative of the Department of Public Works, are responsible for this work, and these officials use their judgement as to the fitness of the ice for travel. It is expected that the ice of the harbour will be bushed in the near future. The ice between Charlottetown and Rocky Point has attained a thickness of six inches.

Reports which are to hand from the Federal Grading office, Montreal, gives our Island cheese 97.2 no. 1's and special, and butter 98.4 No. 1's and special. There was a decrease in the quantity graded this year largely due to the dry season and low price of cheese as compared with butter. The decrease in the quantity of butter graded is accounted for in the unusual amount of butter put up in prints for which no official grade can be given. This is a record which is hard to beat and reflects great credit on our makers and also on the patrons for the way they take care of their milk and cream on the farms.

**BAKING BY ELECTRICITY AT FALCONWOOD**—The electric oven, recently installed at Falconwood is proving a boon to the institution. The old system of baking direct from fuel, involved considerable labor and caused much litter to be brought into the bake shop. The apparatus consists of a rectangular metallic box, six or seven feet square, and about seven feet high. There are several shelves for the bread pans, each shelf being supplied with a light. The loaves can be seen by opening the shelf door. The baker, Mr. Roberts, is fortunate also in having as an assistant, a patient, who has worked in bakeries in Boston.

The delay was due to unfavorable weather and to ice conditions around the Magdalens. Smelt catches in the Magdalens this season are much larger than those of Prince Edward Island. An appeal will be made to the Department of Fisheries to have the Stanley go to the Magdalens the latter part of January, when it is expected to have almost four hundred barrels ready for shipment.
