Successful Year In Red Cross Work

The meeting opened with the National Anthem, followed by reading of minutes of the last meeting by the Secretary, Hon. Dr. MacMillan.

This was followed by the President's address and the Secretary's report, which was adopted as read. A satisfactory financial report was presented by the Treasurer, Mr. D. A. MacKinnon.

The Nursing Service report by Miss Mona Wilson and Miss M. C. Lean's Junior Red Cross report were then submitted and adopted.

A feature of the program was a beautiful vocal solo "The Forsaken Maid" by Miss Margaret Sterns, which was heartily enjoyed.

DR. BIGGAR'S ADDRESS
Dr. J. L. Biggar, National Commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross Society in the course of an interesting address, dealt with the National Emergency Fund. He stated that the difficulties faced by the Governments last summer were greater than the public were aware of and the carrying out of relief plans proved more difficult than anticipated. The speaker compared the depression to the San Francisco earthquake and its disastrous results, 300,000 people in the Prairie Provinces have had to have relief. He compared the barren areas of the west to the Sahara Desert and the refugees to refugees fleeing in time of war. The speaker believed that had the appeal been made earlier a great deal of suffering might have been averted. He explained that the Emergency Fund had to be postponed several times on account of other appeals being made to the public. Over \$150,000 has been made available in the various provinces and the speaker believed the final sum would exceed \$200,000 and even approach a quarter of a million.

Dr. Biggar commented favorably on the reports presented at the meeting. He stated that in no other part of Canada has such progress been made as has been made in this province in the last two or three years.

The speaker cited approvingly the fact that 273 children have been assisted by the Crippled Children's Fund and added that the work of the Juniors can continue only through the senior organization. He also referred to the information in the Treasurer's report that the Juniors of the organization contributed nearly one half as much as the adults.

Dr. Biggar summed up the necessary characteristics of the Society as energy, enthusiasm, efficiency and economy in administration. He concluded by assuring contributors that the money received by the organization is going a long way to accomplish the cause for which the Society stands.

The meeting was closed with Benediction by Rev. H. D. Raymond.

THE FOLLOWING ADDRESS WAS DELIVERED BY THE PRESIDENT, DR. H. D. JOHNSON:

Ladies and Gentlemen:—"Before saying anything about the working of our society, I wish to welcome to Charlottetown and to our meeting, the National Commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross, Dr. J. L. Biggar, a gentleman whom I have known for a long time, and whose good work I have followed with appreciation.

"I shall not dwell on his splendid contribution to the advancement of Red Cross work throughout Canada, but shall ask him to speak to you in a little while, and then you will understand what manner of man he is.

"At our last annual meeting I spoke about a change in the programme of work of the Red Cross in this Province. That change took place on the first of July, 1931, and as a result of the work of our public health nurses comes now directly under the Department of Health. The same nurses, with others, are still doing the work inaugurated by us, and the people are getting the benefit.

"The aim of our Society is to co-operate with all existing Societies that work for the improvement of health, the prevention of disease and the lessening of suffering and our duty is to take up any work along these lines that should be done and that is not being done by any other organization.

"When we have organized such work and the time comes that some other society is willing to take on the work and has the facilities to do it better, we should consider our duty to be to hand over to them and look around for some other branch of endeavor that is needed in the Province.

"It has been well said that the health of the people, and especially of our young people, is the foundation upon which rests the happiness of the people.

"To the various Service Clubs who have helped us, and to all our voluntary workers, our deepest thanks are given.

"Without the help of these, our work, especially for handicapped children, could not be done.

"In conclusion we wish to thank you all for coming to this meeting. We trust you will long continue as faithful helpers, financially and otherwise, to our Society, which is one of the, if not the largest and most widely distributed societies in the world.

"You will remember that last December the Prime Minister of Canada asked the Canadian Red Cross to act as a Collecting and Distributing Agency of a National Emergency Fund. Our Provincial Division took the matter up, and as a result we with the assistance of several societies have received over seven hundred dollars for that appeal. Our list has not yet been closed, and we hope to get more assistance from our people.

"I think Dr. Biggar may have something to say on this subject so I shall not speak further about it."

NATIONAL EMERGENCY FUND

"My thanks are given to the Executive Committee for their attention and good counsel, and their many kindnesses during the past year, and I wish specially to bring to your notice the faithful and most efficient work of our Office Secretary Miss Arsenault, whose hours of work are almost unlimited, and whose office management is most praiseworthy.

"Miss McLean, our Junior Red Cross Director, has done splendid work, and her report will give you some little idea of the volume of work, and the amount of travelling and speaking she has done.

"Mrs. McDonnell, our Massesse's, worthy of all praise for her careful and skilful treatment of the handicapped little ones."

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The following report was read by Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Provincial Minister of Health and Education:

To the Officers and Members of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Red Cross Society.

Ladies and Gentlemen: The duty devolves on me of presenting to you the Annual Report of the Secretary and I can say that we have had a most successful year's work, and under a few headings, I will endeavor to review the record for the past year.

Last Spring we had our Annual Financial and Membership Campaign, and it is a pleasure to report that it was very successful. The total amount was \$3,109.73 which was \$300 less than the previous year's collections, and this I think was very satisfactory when we consider the universal depression through which we are passing and which was felt more in this Province than in any previous year. I wish to express the sincere thanks of this Division to the splendid committee of ladies and gentlemen who undertook the house to house and the business men's canvass in Charlottetown, and to the Members of the I. O. D. E. who managed the collection in Summerside. For the success of the collection in the country we are indebted to the Women's Institutes and to the Public School Teachers in their various districts. I wish to say to the public generally—that the Red Cross Society is still carrying on in the Province, that there is much work that can be and must be done and we are asking for that generous support which has always been given us by the public-spirited citizens of this Province.

Years of Progress

On the 30th of June, 1931, the first chapter of Red Cross endeavor in this Province was completed. For ten and a half years the Society has functioned and every year the Public Health Nursing Programme was enlarged and on the first of July, 1931, our Red Cross Nursing Staff was taken over and absorbed into the general Health Service of the Province, which was made possible by the splendid efforts of Dr. R. E. Wodehouse, Secretary of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association and the financial assistance which he has been able to obtain from the Canadian Life Insurance Companies to whom the Canadian people are deeply indebted for the financial assistance they have furnished for many years in promoting efficient medical and public health services in Canada. The ten and a half

years of the Red Cross in Prince Edward Island have been years of wonderful progress in Public Health. The Nursing Service has done the spade work, has laid the foundation, deep and strong, and the great results of this Service are plainly evident in our Schools and among our children, and the proof of it is furnished by a perusal of our statistics by our lessened death rate in communicable diseases and tuberculosis. I anticipate that each year will see still greater progress under our New Public Health Programme.

A most important branch of our work is the Junior Red Cross, and there was a splendid increase in membership and in work done during the past year. The Junior Red Cross Branches or Health Clubs in the Schools are one of the greatest educational factors in the practice of Health, civics and service to handicapped children, and I wish to emphasize its value to the people of Prince Edward Island. The Director of Junior Red Cross work will deal fully with this phase of our work.

Crippled Children's Work

A most important branch of Red Cross activities is Crippled Children's Work, which was begun here about five years ago, and under the wonderful supervision of Miss Mona Wilson has made remarkable progress so that we are in the proud position of being able to say that no Province in Canada surpasses us in our attention to that most appealing of God's Creatures—the Crippled Child. In this Province we will never be able to pay our debt of gratitude to Dr. T. B. Acker, of Halifax, the famous Crippled Children's Specialist, who comes to us twice a year, spending 1 to 2 weeks each time and the results of whose wonderful work is now manifest in many homes in this Province. Two clinics were held last year in Charlottetown and Summerside and 273 examinations were made, and besides the Specialist's advice on the various orthopedic conditions was given to children and many adults in addition to manipulations, corrections and operations performed at the Hospitals, and every hospital and physician in this Province is supporting and promoting this great humanitarian work. In connection with Crippled and Undernourished Children, I wish to sincerely thank the Rotary and Gyro Clubs for maintaining a summer camp each year, where a large number of children are given two weeks of supervised care, under conditions which are invaluable in promoting their physical development and welfare.

Generous Response

The Sale of Tuberculosis Christmas Seals conducted by this Division for the past four years, was turned over to the Gyro Club of Charlottetown and it is pleasing to learn that they received the same generous response from the citizens of this City. We are much interested in this work because \$500 of the amount realized is to be donated to our Children's Fund.

This Division in conjunction with all others in Canada responded to the request of the Prime Minister of Canada, and the Canadian Red Cross furnished the machinery for the National emergency appeal made by Prime Minister Bennett in December, in Charlottetown the work was successfully carried out by groups of workers representing the following societies: Women's Auxiliary of the Canadian Legion, Rebekah Lodge of the I. O. O. F., Catholic Women's League, Orange Ladies' Lodge, Y's Men, Knights of Columbus, Benevolent Irish Society, St. Lawrence Lodge of the I. O. O. F. The total amount collected was \$555.94. An additional sum of \$127.50 was received from Thirteen Women's Institutes, making a total of \$683.44 on December 31st. One half of this sum goes to National Headquarters for distribution to sufferers in the Western Provinces, and the remainder is to be used for family relief in this Province.

Reviewing the work of the year, I feel quite justified in saying it has been a very successful year, and I wish to thank the Press for many items of publicity always readily and generously given, and also all public spirited and generous hearted citizens who are assisting in making the work of the Red Cross
