### Junior Abbies Are Winners Of Exhibition Tilt

In an exhibition hockey encounter played over the week-end Junior Abbies, tuning up for their playoff series with the New Brunswick junior titlists skated to a 5-3 victory over a snappy Saur Dunstan's junior squad.

In an action-filled first period Abbies emerged with a 3-1 lead. In the middle session, although not as fast and exciting as the first saw play fairly even with the scoreboard reading 4-2 for the Abbies, each team notching one goal.

Counts came back strong in the third session to have a bit the better of the play but the best they could do was to again split two goals with their city rivals.
