## LOCAL BRIEFS

The Latest News of the City  
and Province.

Gathered By Guardian Reporters and Cor-  
respondents Everywhere.

MESSRS W. W. Wellner, E. W. Taylor, G. H. Taylor, W. N. Tanton, G. F. Hutcheson and L. W. Cook, have decided to close their stores every evening at six o'clock, beginning next Monday. This is a move in the right direction.

THERE was a fair attendance at the market yesterday. The price of eggs dropped from 15 to 16 down to from 11 to 13 cents; some potatoes sold as high as 40 cents per bushel; other prices remain about the same as last quotations.

THE Standard newspaper office, Regina, N. W. T., was burned on Saturday. Loss six thousand. Mr. J. K. McInnis, the editor of the Standard, and who is also Mayor of Regina, is a native of North Wiltshire, P. E. I., and is well known throughout the province.

The Supreme court met yesterday to deliver judgment in the Meddie Gallant election case which was heard before Mr. Justice Hodgson at Alberton when Gallant was unseated and disqualified. From that decision he appealed, and the appeal was heard before the full court. The Chief Justice delivered a written decision holding that the election was void on account of corrupt practices by agents of Gallant, and on these points agreed with Mr. Justice Hodgson who first tried the case. In the second place the Chief Justice disagreed with the finding of the trial judge in holding that Gallant had personally bribed Colo Arsenault. The Chief Justice held that the money was given as a loan, and was not a corrupt act. Mr. Justice Hodgson adhered to the decision given by him at the trial and read a long judgment giving his reasons in full. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald concurred with the Chief Justice. He also read his decision. The appeal therefore from Mr. Justice Hodgson's decision was dismissed with costs to be paid by Gallant, but the disqualifying finding was reversed. The election is set aside and declared void by reason of corrupt practices by agents of Gallant.

A RUNAWAY on Queen Street shortly after eight o'clock last night caused considerable excitement. The driver was thrown out near Sentner, McLeod & Co's and the horse kept up his mad pace until he was captured by some men on Queen's wharf. No serious damage was done.

OBITUARY.—The many friends of Mr. Frederic Hardy of Grenfell, Assa., formerly of Little York, P. E. I., will be pained to hear of his sudden death, which occurred after only a few days illness on the 4th inst. It is only a year since Mrs. Hardy had to endure the sorrow of parting with her eldest daughter. To her and the bereaved children her many Island friends extend their sincere sympathy. Mr. Hardy was in his 53rd year.

THE basement of Zion church was filled last night with a large audience to hear Rev. T. F. Fuller on lecture on Ireland. The lecturer began with a brief geographical description and historical review of Ireland. A large number of stereopticon views were presented, showing the beautiful scenery and the chief historical places. The lecture was interspersed with numerous Irish jokes and anecdotes for which the Island is famous. At the conclusion of the lecture a vote of thanks was tendered to the lecturer and Mr. Morrison, who managed the views, to which Mr. Fullerton suitably responded.

At a meeting held at Belle River schoolhouse on the 14th inst, for the purpose of reorganizing and putting into working shape, Thistle L. O. A vote of thanks was given to the County Officers present, and worshipful District Master for attending to Thistle Lodge; also to visiting brethren, to which a suitable reply was made. 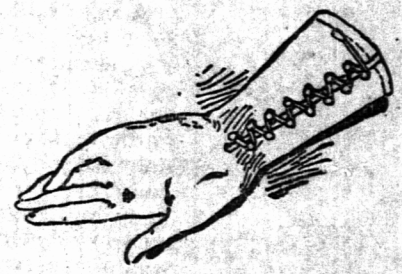
### DIED.
