

COUNCIL MEETING HELD LAST NIGHT

Usual Routine - Number of Letters Received and Attended To - Permanent Works to Be Continued - Debentures to Be Asked For - Salvage Corps To Be Re-organized.

The regular meeting of the City Council was held last night, Mayor Paton presiding and all the Councillors being present.

After routine and the passing of bills, it was ordered that hereafter no bills would be paid unless accompanied by the requisitions upon which goods were delivered.

A number of communications were read and disposed of as follows: - A petition from residents of Bishop Street and vicinity praying that that thoroughfare be opened through to Prince St. was referred to the Street Committee.

A letter from the Fruit Growers' Association asking for a grant of \$50 was held over till such time as the estimates will be prepared.

A letter from W. P. Doull, declaring the writers opinion that the office of city electrician was a farcical thing, and that it prevented Mr. Doull's doing business in his line fairly, was referred to the Light Committee.

A letter from W. Hyndman, accompanied by a plan, relating to the proposed extension of Rochford Street was handed over to the City Surveyor, with instructions to prepare an estimate of the cost.

A letter from the Secretary of the School Board was read, calling for the sum of \$13,731 the estimate required for the year less \$115.23 unexpended balance from last year. This will be considered when the civic estimates are being prepared.

In regard to the bill filed in Chancery by L. P. Tanton the matter was quietly handed over to the Recorder to deal with according to his judgment.

Island was going to be taken over by the Canadian Bank of Commerce it would be well to empower the Finance Committee to deal with some other bank from which perhaps better terms might be obtained.

Several of the Councillors spoke on this subject and it was decided to place the account where the best terms could be got.

Councillor Hooper moved the following resolution which carried: Resolved that the Legislative Assembly be petitioned to pass an Act at the coming session of the Legislature authorizing the City Council to issue Debentures payable in twenty years at a rate of interest not exceeding four per cent for a further sum of twenty thousand dollars to be expended in putting down permanent streets and sidewalks and that provision be made for a sinking fund for redemption of said fund within said period of twenty years; and further resolved that a bill be prepared by the Recorder embodying the provisions of the above resolution to be presented to the Legislature.

Councillor Rogers seconded by Councillor Prose moved that H. R. Large be appointed Captain of the Salvage Corps. After some discussion the motion carried. Council adjourned.

MONTREAL, March 10.-An important change took place in the management of the Canadian Rubber Company at the annual meeting to day, when Major G. Washington Stephens, M. L. A. was elected president in place of Sir H. Montagu Allan, and Lorne McGibbon becomes vice-president and general manager. The other directors elected are C. C. Ballantyne, Harrison C. Frost, Alex. Pringle, R. J. Younce, Shirley Ogilvie, H. J. Fuller and M. C. Mullarkey. Some weeks ago it was announced that Major Stephens and Mr. McGibbon, representing a syndicate, had bought out a controlling interest. These changes are the outcome. The company has in hand arrangements for the establishment of a branch house in London, England on a large scale. The annual report was considered satisfactory, notwithstanding the high cost of the raw material.

DEBATE ON THE ADDRESS IN PARLIAMENT YESTERDAY

Mover and Seconder Made Conventional Speeches - Borden Criticised Cabinet Changes, Censured Fisher's Anti-Preference Speech, Welcomes Reconsideration of His Salary But Justifies Increased Pay to Members - Laurier Replied and Foster Followed.

OTTAWA, March 12.- (Special) - In the House today W. E. Knowles, the new member for West Assinabola moved the address in reply in a conventional speech. William Chisholm seconded it. R. L. Borden responded referring to the loss from the Cabinet of Prefontaine and Mulock. He criticized Hon. Mr. Fisher's often quoted speech expressing his pleasure that England disapproved of the proposed preference and contrasting it with utterances of Mr. Fielding and Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He drew a comparison with Mr. Tarte's indiscretion which had lost him his seat in the Cabinet.

Hon. Mr. Aylesworth also, he said, showed himself opposed to the Government policy by criticizing its superannuation scheme. Regarding this measure Mr. Borden said he would begin to have the whole matter gone over again, especially as concerning his own position. He thought the increase to members could be readily justified. He thought the Insurance Commission should have been a parliamentary one. He said one of the present commissioners is closely connected with the insurance companies, and he promised his assistance to shorten the session.

Replying to Mr. Borden's accusation of unfairness in the Northwest elections Sir Wilfrid Laurier justified the rejection of Mr. Haultain as Premier and stated that if election offences were committed it was a matter for the provincial authorities. Regarding the indemnity bill he said that possibly some changes could be made with advantage. Mr. Aylesworth had consulted him before promising to amend the measure. He said he hoped the session would close in three months. Mr. Foster and others contributed to a lively debate which followed.

DREYFUS CASE AGAIN TO FRONT.

PARIS, March 10.-Major Culgnat has written an open letter denouncing the delay in the Dreyfus case before the court of cassation and intimating that the delay is due to official manipulation of the secret papers in the case. Major Culgnat is the officer who discovered the Henry forgery while he was examining the Dreyfus documents at the time M. Cavaignac was minister of war and who had a dispute with the late minister, General Andre, about some of the papers.

MINE WORKERS ARE SURPRISED

At Refusal of the Companies to Make Concession and Threaten to Quit Work. SHAMOKIN, March 12.- (Special) - The news here that the anthracite coal companies will not grant a single demand of the United Mine Workers is received with surprise and disappointment. Many of the miners have declared they will quit work in April unless they receive concessions.

SENATOR MILLER QUILTS HIS PARTY

OTTAWA, March 10.-Senator Miller, of Nova Scotia, has notified R. L. Borden that on account of his opposition to Mr. Borden as leader, and also in view of his (Borden's) action in connection with the pension, salary and indemnity bills of last session, Senator Miller will in future be an independent Liberal-Conservative, owing allegiance to no party. In this way the old war horse disappears.

H. H. ROGERS GETS ANOTHER DELAY

NEW YORK, March 10.-Decision on the question whether H. H. Rogers shall be compelled to answer the question asked of him in the Missouri oil hearing and which he has refused to answer has been postponed until March 20. Justice Hildersleeve, who heard the arguments, directed the adjournment to await a final decision in the Missouri case relative to a similar case.

THE UNIVERSAL POSTAL UNION

OTTAWA, March 10.-The Universal Postal Union, which settles all matters of postal interest, such as transient rates, changes in postage rates, authorizing the formation of new conventions as regards parcels post, money orders, and postal work generally, meets in Rome on April 7. The last convention was held in 1897, and delegates from all over the world attended it. Dr. Coulter, deputy post master general, has been appointed to represent Canada at this convention, and left Ottawa yesterday for New York, en route for Rome.

El Paso, March 10.-The Rock Island train on which Charles M. Schwab is going east reached here many hours late. Mr. Schwab is very low and it is expected he may die at any time.

FORT WILLIAM HAS TYPHOID

TORONTO, March 10.-There is a typhoid fever epidemic at Fort William. A telegram was received here announcing that there are 700 cases and thereof the 13 doctors are ill. There is a pressing need of nurses and hospital accommodations. The grain section of the board of trade held a meeting yesterday and subscribed \$200 for the relief of the sufferers. The Ontario government will be asked to take action.

MONOLITH FOR N. Y. CATHEDRAL.

NEW YORK, March 10.-The largest stone ever quarried was extracted from a granite ledge in Maine, to serve as one of the eight columns to support the great dome of the Episcopal Cathedral of St. John the Divine, in New York. In the rough the stone measured 61 feet in length and was 8 1/2 feet thick and 7 feet wide, its weight being 310 tons. To turn it into cylindrical form a lathe costing over \$3,500 was built.

RHODES SCHOLARS AT OXFORD

LONDON, March 10.-Three United States Rhodes scholars won three firsts and one second at the Oxford field sports meeting. E. M. Young, of South Dakota, won the high jump, with 5 feet 6 inches, and also won the broad jump, with 22 feet. Warren E. Schutt, of Cornell University, was first in the mile. Time 4:28 3/5. Albert M. Stevens, of Connecticut took the special place in the hammer throwing contest.

REV SAM JONES SPEAKS.
