UNLIMITED POSSIBILITIES

Ex-Secretary Root Speaks of Canada.

He Says Roosevelt's Election is Sure—Talk with Ex-Secretary of War in the U. S. Government.

(Montreal Herald.)

Hon. Edith Root, ex-Secretary of War in President Roosevelt's Cabinet, does not travel in a private car, although the reports generally as one of the greatest statesmen of the progressive movement of the boundary line has produced in recent years. Mr. Root is in the administration now, but he is a politician still, and in a large figure in the eyes of the public. When he reached Montreal he came in a parlor car, but it was one of the ordinary sort where his neighbor might be anyone who had the money to pay for a seat. When he left Montreal today he was in the Maritime Express he traveled in the same manner. For a great man Mr. Root is especially accessible. He does not screen himself behind a secretary, a valet and a railway porter, he can easily be seen if one has his nose with him.

Although an open Democratic nature Mr. Root is not a Democrat politically. He is an ultra-Republican and this was evidenced by the manner in which he pointed to the Herald man when he had for an opinion on the result of the coming Presidential campaign in the United States.

"ROOSEVELT ALL THE WAY." "Why there is nothing to it but Roosevelt," said he. "The Democrats have no possible chance of winning, and I believe the President's plurality will be even larger than that of President McKinley at the last election. President Roosevelt is popular personally, in spite of the efforts of the Democratic press to stimulate a hostile feeling. He is a clean man and has given a clean administration of the United States. Apart from the President's personal popularity, the Republican party is stronger now than ever before.

"Judge Barker is a good candidate. I know him very well, and personally he is an exceptionally fine fellow. It will be a contest between two clean men, and I don't think there will be much room for objectionable personalities on either side, even if there should be any disposition to introduce them.

CANADA'S BEST RESOURCES. "What do I think of Canada and its future? It is a great country, and must grow. We in the States are anxious to see it grow, for prosperity for Canada means added prosperity for us. Its resources are wonderful, and practically without a limit, so I can't see where its prosperity should be limited in any sense. I don't want to say anything about reciprocity with Canada, for, as you know, I think on this point divided in the United States, and at present I do not care to speak.

"As for the American invasion of Canada, I don't understand it for Americans are usually quick to grasp an opportunity, and in Canada they see a great one. It ought to be a good thing for you, for you need the people and the money here to develop your country and we can furnish both. No, it certainly does not mean that Canada is a better country than ours; I am not impartial enough to say that, but you have an advantage over us in that your country is younger, and a young country always offers opportunities for young men.

A YOUNG MAN'S COUNTRY. Canada is, to say mind, a country for young men, and, mind you, when I say that, I don't mean that we are so old ourselves that we are in the least stage of decay in the States. We are more developed than you only because we have the start over you. Eventually Canada will become just as prosperous and just as powerful as the United States. "The labor question in the United States at present is a complicated one, but it can be solved, and I do not believe that the American laboring man will ever be a barrier to our national progress."
