OUR OTTAWA LETTER

which was a great financial loss to producers.

Figures just given out here show that on February 28th the Military Hospitals Commission had under its care 4,055 invalid members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Of these 3,149 had been overseas, the remaining 906 being "camp" men. On the date mentioned there were 1,998 in the Convalescent Hospitals, besides 1,222 out-patients. In other institutions there were 312 men, besides out-patients. Added together these make a total of 2,816 in-patients and 1,229 out-patients. The total of 4,055 shows an increase of 1,421 since December 2, 1916, the date of the figures given in the Hospitals Commission's bulletin issued just before the end of the year.

Great Britain is negotiating for the purchase of the entire Canadian wheat crop of 1917. The price at which this product is to change hands and lessen details of the purchase are at present the subject of correspondence between Ottawa and London. For reasons which will be readily understood no statement in respect to the negotiations can be made by the government here, but it is understood that the views of the western farmers were obtained the other day when a large delegation of them met Sir George Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce. Sir George explained the British proposals to the farmers representatives, and it is understood that they will present their answer shortly. Last year Britain purchased outright the wheat crop of Australia. The total wheat crop of the Dominion in 1915 was 350,000,000 bushels, last year, owing to rust and drought, it was considerably less.

Col. Herbert Bruce, M. D. of Toronto, who made an investigation of the Canadian medical services in Great Britain for General Sir Sar. Hughes, has just forwarded his report to the Minister of Militia. The report, which has already been given considerable unofficial publicity, was the direct cause of the investigation conducted by Surgeon General Pattie. Col. Bruce's report will be table when Parliament reassembles, and will likely provoke a good deal of discussion. Col. Bruce sailed from New York last week for England. He has been appointed one of the British Medical Inspectors General for the front, and will be associated there with some of the most notable British surgeons.

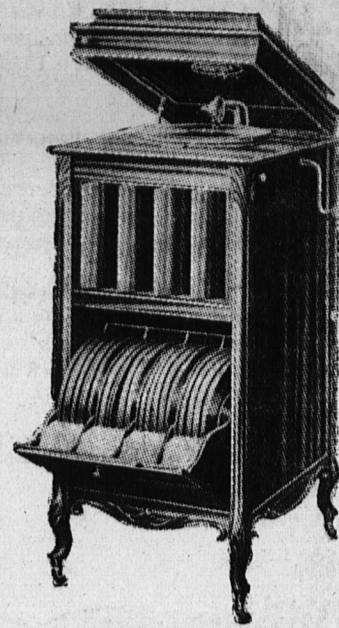
