UNEASY FEELING

In Britain over Affairs in the Transvaal.

UNBEARABLE SITUATION

Archbishop of Canterbury Trying Ritualists for use of Incense.

LONDON, May 8.—(Special)—The Transvaal difficulty is causing an uneasy feeling and the belief is that England has reached the limit of tolerance of Lord Paul's diplomacy and that something will be done to terminate the present unbearable situation.

Today an ecclesiastical court presided over by the Archbishop of Canterbury began an inquiry into the charge against Rev. Henry Westall of the ceremonial use of incense and lights, and against Rev. Edward Ram of the ceremonial use of incense.

The court has no legal status.

BUDGET SPEECH

Of Hon. D. Farquharson Last Night.

RECEIPTS AND OUTLAY

Must Balance This Year—Other Proceedings—Prorogation Friday.

Monday May 8.

The House met at 5.45 afternoon. In reply to Mr. Campbell the Commissioner of Public Works said it was contemplated to build a steel bridge at Victoria, Crapaud. They had an offer and trusted that soon they would then have a steel bridge built there.

In reply to Mr. Shaw the Commissioner of Public Works said that all the available information in regard to the P. W. College contract would be presented.

Mr. Shaw asked the Commissioner of Public Works to lay on the table of this House a copy of all tenders for supplying with Beef and Flour for the Hospital for the Insane and Poor House for the year 1898 respectively, and the names of the tenders accepted.

The commissioner of Public Works laid the papers on the table.

Hon. Mr. Rodgers moved the House into committee. Mr. Forbes in the chair to consider an act to amend the city of Charlottetown, Incorporation Act. Committee reported progress.

Mr. D. A. McKinnon presented a petition praying for a Bill to incorporate the Montague Electric Company. Bill was received and read a first time.

A Bill to incorporate the Mt. Stewart Foresters Hall Company was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson gives notice that on a future day he will move the following resolution:—

Resolved, That an humble address be presented to Her Majesty the Queen, setting forth that the provisions of the British North American Act of 1867, respecting the legislative functions of the Senate of Canada, are unsatisfactory and should be so amended as to bring that body more into harmony with the principles of representative government and praying that Her Majesty may be pleased to recommend to the Imperial Parliament such an amendment to the said Act, as will provide that if the House of Commons passes any bill and the Senate rejects such bill or fails to pass it, or passes it, with any amendments to which the House of Commons will not agree and to which amendments the Senate adheres, the Governor General may by message upon the advice of his council convene a joint sitting of the two houses, which sitting shall decide by a joint vote without debate the question in controversy between the two houses.

At the evening session in moving the House into Committee of Supply Hon. D. Farquharson thanked the opposition for their consideration. Referring to immigration, he thought our people had been too much taught that they could not get along here. Some went to the Yukon and we had an interest in having good government there. But he thought we ought to be in a position to keep our people at home. We are slowgoing, and prone to sleep on our rights. But while we have few other manufactures we have our butter, cheese and lobster industries. Yet our people are leaving us, and we want to keep them at home. 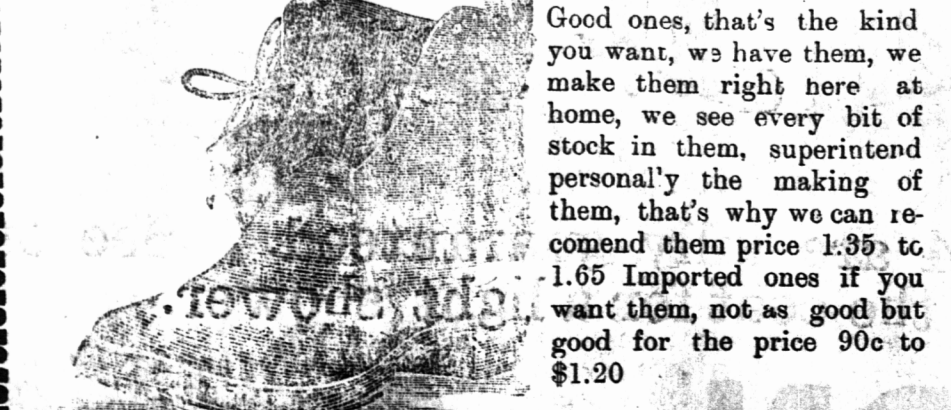
