DIocese Changes. — The following changes among the Catholic clergy of this Diocese have been made by His Lordship Bishop O'Leary: Rev. A. L. Sinnott of the Cathedral staff to Rollo Bay; Rev. Louis Callaghan of Rollo Bay to the Cathedral staff; Rev. Wm. McCabe of the Cathedral staff to Tignish; Rev. M. Rooney from Tignish to Cardigan; Rev. E. Gillis, Cardigan, retires and will reside in the City Hospital. For the present Rev. Walter McGuigan, Fort Augustus, will be stationed at Cardigan.

CATTLE IMPROVEMENT CENTRE.—Last Thursday evening a meeting was held at Iona for the purpose of organizing a Cattle Improvement Centre. The meeting was largely attended and was most enthusiastic. Addresses were delivered by Messrs W. R. Shaw, Live Stock Supt., and C. A. Archibald, Federal Promoter Cattle Division on the various policies in operation for the improvement of cattle. After considerable discussion, it was decided to organize a Bull Loaning centre composed of three district units, embracing Iona, East, Iona West, and Newtown Cross. Organization for each of these units was quickly effected and the members signed up. It was further decided to select the Guernsey breed for the district, the bulls to be delivered the latter part of the winter. This centre makes the fifth organized in the province during the present season.

DEPARTURE REGRETTED.—The many friends in Hunter River of Mrs. Annie Rodgers, (widow of the late Dr. J. A. C. Rodgers) and of her daughter, Miss Anna, were sorry to learn of their removal to Charlottetown, where they will in future reside. Mrs. Rodgers had been a resident of Hunter River for the past fourteen years and during that time had always been willing to give of her time and energy to any worthy cause for the betterment of the village. Being an exceptionally fine musician, she was often called upon to help in musical affairs, and always responded willingly. She was for several years president of the Women's Institute in Hunter River.

MISS ANNA, who was also a general favorite will be greatly missed by a large circle of friends not only amongst the younger folk, but by the older ones as well. As a token of the esteem in which they are held by the citizens of Hunter River, they were the recipients of gifts on the eve of their departure—a beautiful piano lamp was presented to Mrs. Rodgers, while Miss Anna received a brush, comb, and mirror in French ivory. That they may spend many happy years in Charlottetown, with frequent visits to Hunter River, where a warm welcome awaits them at any time, is the sincere wish of their many friends.

PLAN CODE FOR CHANNEL.—A Channel Swimming Association is being formed in England to draw up a code of rules governing channel swimming. Alfred Jones, founder of the Webb Memorial at Dover, pointed out that all recent successes have been achieved by swimming from France to England, while only two persons, Sullivan and Burgess, have rivalled the feat of Captain Webb in swimming from England to France.

He suggests a world's channel swimming trophy be offered to the one who succeeds in swimming from England to France under the proposed code of rules, and that the trophy be held until captured by another aspirant.

Dirigible To Burn Chemicalized Marsh Gas

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Oct. 28.—Construction secrets of the world's largest and first gas-burning dirigible, the L. Z. 127, have been partially disclosed by Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander.

The gas fuel is marsh gas or carburetted hydrogen with the chemical formula CH₄. Much lighter and more efficient than gasoline or benzol, Dr. Eckener said, the gas draws its greatest advantage from the fact that when it expands in the engine cylinders one of the products is water vapor. The vapor, passing out through the exhausts of the five 420-horsepower Maybach motors, will be condensed in tanks; part of it used to replenish water in the cooling systems of the motors and the rest stored as ballast.

As ballast, the exhaust water will more than make up for the loss in weight the dirigible will suffer when fuel is consumed enroute so that instead of letting out expensive hydrogen from the gas bag either before landing or when forced into high altitudes, water can be discharged from the tanks.

The use of carburetted hydrogen will cut down by 35 per cent the initial useful load carried by the dirigible.

BEAM TRANSMISSION A PROVED SUCCESS

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Radio beam transmission is to be started next week between Bodmin, Cornwall, and Montreal, according to the Daily Express. Messages will be dispatched at the rate of more than 100 words per minute simultaneously in both directions during 18 hours out of 24.

Notes on the P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest for the 51 Week Ending Oct. 23, 1926. Mr. Harry Hydes Barred Rocks leads the Contest with 31 eggs, (38.3 points) Mr. Talmage Foster's B. R. were second with 38 eggs, (37.3 points) Mr. Harold Laird's pen of B. R. were third with 28 eggs, (32.1 points).

Only one pen failed to lay any eggs during the week, but nine pens laid less than 1 dozen, so that the Contest is practically completed. The birds have one more week to go, but Mr. Foster's pen is the only one in which every hen is laying. The highest hen to date is No. 117, W. L., owned by the Experimental Farm. She has laid 279 eggs, and has (276.3 points) Mr. Harold Laird's B. R. hen No. 150 is second with 270 eggs (266.1 points) Mr. Clifford McEwen's B. R. hen No. 155 is third with 259 eggs (262.5 points) Mr. Harold Laird's hen No. 143 is fourth with 225 eggs (262.3 points). Mr. Joseph Carmichael's B. R. No. 188 is fifth with 217 eggs (257.3 points) Mr. Harry Hydes's B. R. hen No. 122 is sixth with 209 eggs, (254.5 points).

Iowa Votes For Women

DES MOINES, Oct. 28.—Men will make their last stand for exclusive right to public office in Iowa in the November election. But it will not be a determined stand and there are indications that they will contribute largely to their own rout.

The voters will pass finally upon a constitutional amendment giving women the right to hold membership in the state houses of representatives, the only office to which they are not now eligible. In the past, women have had little success in campaigns for the higher offices but have scored heavily in contests for county and municipal berths.

FINGER PRINTS ON ART

PARIS, Oct. 28.—Important progress has been made by the International Institute of Intellectual Cooperation in regard to the problem of finding an absolutely reliable method of identifying works of art. Researches have been made into the part which may be played by radiography, microphotography, and chemical analysis, but the method put forward by the French Minister of Education, M. de Monzie, still holds the field so far as pictures by living artists are concerned.

M. de Monzie's scheme is the protection of works by art by means of finger-prints. The International Institute has collected all the researches on the subject and is now preparing a report. It is evident that any legislative method of protection must be an international one, and the Institute, whose offices are at 2 rue de Montpensier, Paris, will welcome suggestions from all nations which may help forward this scheme.
