"Mr. Bennett then made a request to the British Government for postponement, based upon reasons that to him were satisfac- tory, and we had no other alternative than to accept the suggestion of Mr. Bennett, and that we did."

Mr. Wardlaw-Milne, on a point of order, asked whether Mr. Thomas was in order in suggesting "that there was anything derogatory to the Dominions in my supplementary. My question did not mention the Dominions," he said. "I merely asked a definite additional question to which I have not had any reply."

Speaker Ends Discussion "Suggestions of that kind are al- ways undesirable," observed Mr. Speaker.

Then Labor's Left Wing wanted information. "In view of the post- ponement of the conference," asked E. F. Wise, Labor, "will the Govern- ment now lay before the House its own proposals for control of imports and better organization of the im- port trade?" Mr. Thomas made no reply.
