MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 3.—Owing to the fact that the Winnipeg and Chicago grain exchanges were closed on Saturday, there was practically no demand from foreign buyers on the Montreal market for any kind of grain. Extreme dullness also marked the trade in the domestic market but prices unchanged. Ontario and Quebec, No. 2, white oats were quoted at 52 cts., No. 3 white at 50 1/2 c., and No. 4 white at 49 1/2 c. per bushel. The spring and winter wheat flour grades was without any new feature to note. Business was quiet and prices steady. The market for all lines of millfeed was quiet. The prices were well maintained. The demand for rolled oats limited but the tendency was steady. Owing to an improved foreign demand for butter, prices were advanced 1/4-3/4 ct. per pound. The cheese trade was inactive but firm. Prices for all grades of fresh eggs were reduced another three to five cents per dozen.
