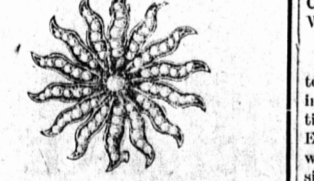

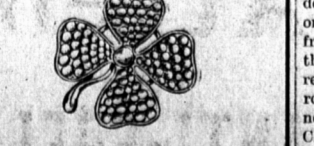

WHAT is perhaps not generally known is that the S. S. Minto has been equipped with all the appliances for submarine signalling.

W. W. Stewart, of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Parrish, N. S., is transferred to Charlottetown. His place will be filled by Mr. Allen of the Glace Bay agency.

The Minto left yesterday morning at seven o'clock for Pictou and is expected to return this morning. If the weather be fine mails will come via Tormentine today.

REV. WILLIAM DOBSON of First Methodist church Charlottetown will speak at a missionary meeting at Brackley Point Road on Wednesday next the 21st inst.

THE Darlington Post Office has been transferred from its former location to the residence of Andrew Wyand. The office is now much more conveniently situated than in the past and the change is giving general satisfaction.

A RICHIBUCTO, N. B., despatch says: Owing to the northwest gales of Friday and Saturday no attempt was made to reach the steamer which had been displaying signals off Richibucto Cape for two days. Later the gale shifted to northeast and the steamer went in the direction of West Point, P. E. Island.

CAPT. J. G. KNIGHT, a former Nova Scotian, died on Oct. 28th, of heart failure at Claremont, Western Australia. Capt. Knight resided in Australia for many years. He was the son of the late Rev. Richard Knight, and is survived by Richard N. of St. John, and William of Moncton, and two sisters, Mrs. R. V. Jost, of Charlottetown, and Mrs. William Hanson.

THE Ontario Agricultural College graduates in the Maritime Provinces held a reunion banquet in Amherst last week and organized. The special guests at the banquet were Stock Commissioner Hodson, F. L. Hazard and Rev. A. E. Burke. Prof. Cumming, principal of the new Truro Agricultural College which is destined to fill a large space in maritime agricultural life was chosen president and Prof. J. A. Ready responded to the toast "Maritime Agriculture."

HON. W. S. FIELDING, Mrs. Fielding and their daughter, Miss Zillah Fielding, sailed from New York last week for Naples and Genoa and then to Vienna. Mrs. Fielding will remain at Vienna for a time, where Miss Zillah will undergo treatment by the famous Dr. Lorenz. Mr. Fielding will leave them at Vienna make a hurried business trip to London and then return to Canada where he expects to arrive soon after the opening of Parliament.

THE cargo by the Minto Saturday morning included one car beer, one car carriages, one car live stock from the Amherst Winter Fair, 1 car salt and 1200 packages way freight. She left Pictou at seven o'clock and encountered a considerable quantity of ice on the way over, more than on the last trip. There were seventy passengers and one hundred and forty bags mail. Among the passengers were F. L. Hazard, M. L. A. Prof. J. C. Ready, Sec'y of Agriculture, Rev. A. E. Burke, C. R. Smallwood, David Macdonald, Manager of the Glenfman Poultry Station; John B. Andrews, Royalty; H. Hooper, Home, of A. Home & Co, City; John T. Ferguson, Marshfield; John B. Roper, East Royalty; Cephas Nunn and Oliver Saunders, Winsloe Road; Albert Boswell and S. C. Lane, Pownal; Theophilus Turner, Brackley Point Road and George V. Moore, City, from Amherst; Walter Burke from Boston; D. Schurman from Amherst; W. S. Poole from Moncton; Misses Clarke and Lizzie Noonan who are studying at Guelph; W. E. Fools, Lower Montague from the Northwest; Mrs. H. V. Palmer from New York; Harry Winchester from St. John; Fred McLeod from Fredericton; Horace Lowe from Sydney; A. McNeill, Chief of the Fruit Division, Ottawa and W. H. Vroom, Dominion Fruit Inspector.

So far as could be ascertained yesterday there is not an I. C. R. official in the city who knows what connections can be made from St. John to P. E. Island via Cape Tormentine, or whether such a passage is now possible or not. They received advices early in the week, some to the effect that the Stanley would go on the Capes route on Tuesday, and others that she would go on Wednesday, but since then they have had no word, and do not even know if the boat is running or not. The straits are still perfectly free from ice and there is no reason why the two winter steamers should not make return trips every day on any of the four routes open to them. But the Minto is now only giving a tri-weekly service from Charlottetown to Pictou, while no one knows just what the Stanley is doing. Last winter it was announced in all the I. C. R. offices here that the only connection which could be made with the steamers from Pictou was by the train leaving here at noon. Not until the winter had ended were the St. John offices told, and then not officially, that a train from Truro to Pictou connected with the night express from St. John and caught the steamer. Scores of persons went from here at noon and spent twelve hours more than was necessary on the way. This year the St. John officials have no word of any such train from Truro, and if the steamer leaves Pictou at seven o'clock as announced no such connection can be made.—St. John Sun.—Dec. 16.

VISITORS HOME FROM WINTER FAIR

The Island people attending the Maritime Winter Fair Stock Show of Amherst returned home Saturday by the Minto. They reported the fair a great success throughout in every respect except insofar as the peculiar transportation situation precluded exhibitors and visitors from Prince Edward Island from being as numerous as under other circumstances they should have been.

Speaking to Rev. A. E. Burke in the afternoon The Guardian learned that the fat stock classes were perhaps not as crowded as on some previous occasions, but the individual merit of the animals was far in excess of any previous time. His really is what such a fair aims at.

The attendance at all the meetings was very large. It is estimated that fully 7000 people were present Wednesday.

Agricultural addresses were of a high order and claimed the undivided attention of the sea of humanity which filled the immense auditorium.

At the opening the public men of the county expressed adherence to the principle of Maritime Fairs and at the closing meeting over which F. L. Hazard, K. C., presided. After the regular program was through resolutions were passed expressive of appreciation of the speakers, workers, contributors and the city. They were moved by Colin Campbell, Deputy Minister of P. E. I., and Rev. Father Burke of P. E. I.

There was greater interest than ever in the poultry plucking competition although the time made was not as good as usual.

In sweepstakes W. W. Black, Amherst whose herd was at the Prov. Exhibition here carried off the trophy.

Our own Mr. Roper's Royalty brought back no less than 16 ribbons clearly showing that if we could get there we can do the work.

The winners of county fruit prizes were: King's John Robertson, New Perth, Queen's—A. A. Moore, Pownal; Prince—C. A. Black.

George V. Moore of this city took first prize for Andalusian cock and for Andalusian pullets.
