Markets At A Glance

Toronto and Montreal—Stocks closed lower. Toronto Mines—Irregularly higher. New York—Stocks had small net gain. Winnipeg—Wheat closed lower. New York—Cotton, Rubber and coffee lower; sugar unchanged.

LIVESTOCK

MONTEAL, Oct 3.—Offerings on the two Montreal livestock markets today totalled 684. Receipts were composed of 177 cattle, 162 calves, 377 hogs and 220 sheep and lambs. Common to just plain bulls brought \$1.50 to \$1.75 with fair kinds around \$2. There were four loads of western cattle just arrived and were not sold at time of writing. Calves were steady. Prices ranged from \$2 to \$2.25 for grassers to \$3.50 for good veals. Good ewes and weathers were sold for \$5.75 with one lot up to \$6. Culls and bucks were picked out at \$2 per cent. cut. The standard quotation for hams and butchers was \$8.25. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium. Heavies \$7.75. Extra heavies \$8.25. Lights \$6. Some ranged from \$4.00 to \$5.25, according to quality.

PRODUCE

MONTEAL, Oct 3.—A firm tone prevailed in the Montreal dairy and produce market today while butter and cheese eased slightly. The butter market was quiet nominally at 18 1/2 cents a pound for carlots or less of no 1 grade, down 1 cent from yesterday. Further reductions will be necessary as prices still remain far above export level and demand from abroad continues at a low level. A total of 9,876 84 boxes was offered for sale. The cheese market was quoted at 11 1/2 to 11 3/4 cents a pound for Ontario and Ontario colored at 11 1/4 to 11 3/4 while Quebecs brought 10 1/2 to 10 3/4 cents. Quotations were 1 1/2 cent above for the levels. A total of 9,876 84 boxes was offered for sale. On the potato market Maritime stock levels drew nearer Quebec prices. Quebecs brought 70 to 75 cents per 80 pound bag with New Brunswick green mountains at 75 to 80 cents.
