—There was a large attendance at the vestry meeting held in St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Alberton, on Monday afternoon. All the parish, but Alma, was represented. James A. Webb and Chas. G. HOUSE DEBATES YESTERDAY.
(Continued from page 1.)

The Government must be consulted, time would be lost and an epidemic might gain dangerous headway. He read from the law that no local board could incur an expense exceeding \$200 without authority from the Government, which must mean that they had power to incur expense up to that amount. He contended that the local board at Murray River had proper authority to do what they had done and that Dr. Brehaut should be paid.

The discussion was continued by Mr. Dobie, followed by Hon. Mr. Gallant, who admitted that he had promised to bring Dr. Keir's bill to the favorable notice of the Government, but he did not authorize incurring the expense. His colleagues did not think the bill as presented should be paid, but since an itemized account had been rendered, he hoped it might be paid in part. The Premier, Hon. Mr. Richards, Mr. Dobie, Mr. McLean, and others continued the discussion.

MR. KENNEDY, Bradalbane, Mr. Cox, Mr. Wyatt, Hon. Mr. Cummings, Mr. Mathieson, Dr. Warburton continued the discussion over a very wide range.

THE PREMIER in reply to an inquiry stated that Dr. Johnson is paid \$100 as medical adviser of the Provincial Board, and rendered very valuable service. When sent to outside points to investigate contagious outbreaks he is paid \$10 a day. The item of boards of health was then passed.

The Agriculture department estimates, \$8,200 were next taken up. The travelling expenses of the Commissioner, \$350, was criticised by Mr. Mathieson and others. It was pointed out that in a return before the House it is stated that no itemized account of these travelling expenses is kept, or has ever been kept. Mr. Mathieson argued that the Commissioner had pocketed this amount, and had otherwise charged for his actual outlay for expenses in travelling. This was denied by the Commissioner or Mr. Mathieson argued that the amount was excessive, that the Commissioner travelled on a railway pass and was entitled to his actual expenses and not one cent more. He said the vote for travelling expenses was treated as salary. He (Mr. Mathieson) did not know that that this unlawful work was going on. He thought the Commissioner when he realized his position, would pay back into the treasury all the excess over his actual travelling expenses.

HON. MR. RICHARDS said they had listened to a tirade and an untruthful statement. No such narrow minded statement had ever been heard in any Legislature.

Some disorder and a demand for retraction arose on this. Mr. Richards refused to retract.

MR. MATHIESON stated that what he had said was based on the return submitted by the Commissioner to the House. If his words were untrue then the return was untrue. He contended that every cent in excess of the actual expenses of travel ought to be repaid to the treasury and that any honorable man would do it.

HON. MR. RICHARDS said this amount had been voted for six years and had never been challenged. In

other Provinces a lump sum was voted in this way, and no itemized account was ever called for. If it was too much, they ought not to vote it. He had never made a charge outside of the amount voted. He had been repeatedly out of pocket in travelling in other Provinces. He defied anyone to put the finger on a penny that he had taken of the public money for his private use. The leader of the Opposition had misrepresented him.

Cries of order and a demand for retraction followed with a discussion of rules of order. The Chairman ruled that both sides of the House had frequently violated the rules. Later he added there was nothing to take back as one party was as bad as the other.

MR. WYATT challenged the right of the Commissioner to any more than his actual expenses. In the return of travelling expenses of the Engineer of Public Works the items were given, showing that this was what was meant. For the first time the House now learned that the Commissioner of Agriculture kept no account but just put the lump sum in his pocket.
