On Tuesday evening, the 5th inst., the people of Cavendish enjoyed a rare treat in hearing a lecture on "Babylon, Ancient and Modern." The lecturer, Rev. J. A. Winfield, held the closest attention of his audience while he graphically described the rise of Babylon from its founding by Nimrod to the great power and magnificence to which it attained in the time of Nebuchadnezzar and its fall in the time of Belshazzar. His descriptions of the walls of the city and the hanging gardens, which have always been the wonder of the world, were of exceeding interest. He also gave examples of the somewhat severe laws of the Kingdom which were engraved on a pillar in the midst of the city so that all could see and be warned by them. The reverend gentleman, who is connected with an Archaeological Society in England, gave a very interesting description of the excavations that have been carried on for years in the ruins of Babylon where so many records have been found which he claimed went to prove the authenticity of records in the Old Testament. The lecturer in his travels had visited the Pyramids and he gave as a somewhat new theory of how those mighty blocks of stone were raised to such a height. The theory was this:—As the walls were started upwards an inclined plain of lay was built up on the outside of them, which according as the walls rose was raised and extended outward till at the finish it reached 13 miles from the base. Those stones were drawn up this plane to the top and after the building was finished he bank was removed. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer and the hope expressed he would again favor us with another evening's entertainment.

ANNOUNCEMENT IN REGARD TO AVIATION SCHOOL FOR BRITISH ARMY.

LONDON, March 5—When introducing the army estimates in the house of commons yesterday, Lieutenant-Colonel John Edward Bernard Seely, under secretary of state for war, announced that the aviation school, to be established at Salisbury Plain would be for the training of soldiers, sailors and civilians. One hundred and eighty officers would be passed through the school yearly after first learning to fly at their own expense they would receive when they presented their pilot's certificates, and before appointment to the flying corps \$375 to recoup them for the expense they had incurred. The government, he said, was purchasing 131 aeroplanes.

MILLION AND HALF UNEMPLOYED THROUGH COAL STRIKE

LONDON, March 5—The deadlock in coal dispute shows no signs of breach. Numerous meetings were held today in various parts of the country and the unyielding attitude taken up by the miners and some of the owners was invariably endorsed. Nearly half a million workers in other industries have now been thrown out of employment, making with the million miners over a million and a half of unemployed men.
