On Saturday, April 9th, the Georgetown-Lower Montague ferry boat, Montague II, made her first crossing of the season. This is considerably ahead of last spring, when the first run was made on April 18th. Also on Saturday Mr. Thomas Blackett made the trip by dory from Georgetown to Launching, across the mouth of Cardigan River. Herring nets have been set for the past few nights but no reports of any catches have been made, however, any morning now should see the first spring herring making their appearance.

On Saturday evening the Georgetown Athletic Club held a meeting in Kozzy Hall. President James MacConnell, Jr., occupied the chair and a very good attendance of hockey and baseball players were present. The secretary, "Sonny" Johnson reported the hockey team finished the season with a surplus of \$125.00. It was voted to bank \$115.00 of this amount and to donate the \$10.00 balance to the baseball team. A meeting was called for Monday night to discuss plans for the approaching baseball season.

One sure and certain sign that spring is with us to stay, which is even a more dependable harbinger than the first robin or fresh herring, is when the first baseball makes its spring appearance. On Friday Mr. Clarence MacSwain, ardent sportsman and last season's team assistant coach, was observed tossing the old pill about in the first impromptu workout of the season. With every appearance of a fast drying out of the baseball diamond the boys will soon be picking up where they left off last season which was so successful as to take them into the finals against Wellington Dodgers for the Island Intermediate "B" baseball title.

The main harbour is now ice free and the first two lobster boats took to the water on Friday. Harbour pilot, Tomple Gotell getting his boat in the water for the first launching of the season. Marcellus Gotell also launched his boat on Friday and later in the day with F. J. DeLory, Richard DeLory and Alex MacDonald on board made the run to Pamure Island. The first herring nets of the season were believed set Friday evening. Above the Ferry Wharves is still locked in ice but a small piece breaking off the outer edge of this will allow our Ferry Boat, Montague II to commence seasons operations. Captain H. Larsen reports all in readiness on board ship to start runs.
