He has the contract of supplying a goodly number of our lobster factories with provisions, etc.—Mr. Hazel Green has been enjoying himself at home after his winter's studies in P. W. C.—It is rumored that our energetic school teachers have some notion of making a change in their situation. The people are hoping there is no truth in the report.—Mr. J. P. Tanton, agent for the Moncton Pump Co., is doing a stirring business in selling pumps.—Farmers have about wound up their cropping for the season.

EASTERN NOTES.—The farmers are finishing the heavier part of their cropping, but the green feed turnips, and extras of the modern system of farming will take up their attention a little longer. The long looked for rain came at last, and all the crops look fairly well, except the hay, which will certainly be short, on account of a cold and a dry May.—The lobster factories of East Point are doing fairly well, along the north side, at Red Point, poor, at Cheapstow and S. Louis, fair, ood fish are a little better than last week, though nothing like the old time catches and nothing like this time last year.—Bait is very scarce, not nearly enough for the wants of the fishermen, and not much prospect of it getting a plentier when the weather and the water grows warmer.—A few mackerel have been taken in the nets of the West River, but the fishermen don't calculate much on them now, all their preparations for them the last few years ending in disappointment and failure. Seining has done its work pretty thoroughly in destroying the valuable and palatable fish in our waters. Its entire prohibition would probably result in our waters being restocked again, but government's are proverbially slow in moving in these matters which affect what they are pleased to call the common people.

NEW STEAM LAUNDRY.

Mr. A. H. Webster Will Open This Laundry on Wednesday.

As announced some time ago in THE GUARDIAN Mr. A. H. Webster has completed his new laundry in the Scott building, on Kent Street. The general appearance gives one the impression that the idea was to have a first class establishment in every particular. The main entrance is on Kent Street which admits to a large office. A door to the left opens into the marking room, which is fitted with all the necessary accommodations for facilitating work.

Another door to the right leads into the finishing room, which is fitted with all the modern machinery necessary to conduct a first-class business. The machinery has all arrived and has been placed in position.

The first machine in sight after entering the finishing room is an improved Asher collar shaper for turned down collars and shape for straight collars and cuffs. The machine is heated with gas and is a beautiful running piece of machinery.

The next machine is a combined shirt, collar and cuff ironer, made by the Crawford Laundry Machine Co., which has a speed of 190 revolution a minute, fitted with two ironing tables, one for shirts and one for collars and cuffs. This machine is also heated by gas. Then comes the neck and wristband ironer, which is one of the latest improved and has a speed of 90 revolutions a minute.

The clothes mangle is 62 inches wide and is made of the best sheet steel. The work done on these machine is unsurpassed. The machine is specially constructed for table linens and all heavy goods. Fitted with a three and a half inch steam gauge.

Passing along we come to the ironing tables for hand work. Located at the side of the finishing room is a power blower to be used for increasing the heat of the gas flame in the various machines and especially between the sheets, neck and wristband ironer and shirt polisher.

At the rear of the finishing room is the wash room which is fitted with a revolving starcher for collars and cuffs and washer with a capacity of 100 shirts.

Off the wash room is the dry room and to the left are the wash tubs which are all fitted with hot water and steam.

Then comes the engine room and boiler room. The engine and boiler were furnished by the well-known firm of Bruce Stewart & Co. The engine is of 10 horse power and runs very smoothly.

Mr. Webster has spared no pains to make the laundry first-class in every respect. He has spent considerable
